We Thomas Cain, Thomas C. Cain and James H. McKay have this day (to wit 28th Nov) having been together by John Powell of Buchanan Co Ky to covenant to writing, and witness the his last Will and Testament. The said John Powell being sound in mind and of disposing memory, he desires that his wife Mary Powell, ^{in law} have her share out of the same sum to include the dower house and outbuildings, He desires that his wife Mary Powell shall have her dower of Slaves such as she may select, and all the balance of his property to be sold and the proceeds to be used for the payment of his funeral expenses and just debts. After the payment of his debts he wishes his Son Thomas C. Powell to have an amount of money equal to the amount given to his Son Henry J. Powell and Christopher M. Powell. He also desires after his Son Thomas C. Powell shall have received an amount equal to the amount given to Henry J. Powell and Christopher M. Powell, that this Son Henry J. Powell, Christopher M. Powell and Thomas C. Powell shall each have an amount equal to the amount given to City J. Powell. Then if any thing is left to be equally divided between my said City J. Powell part to be given to his wife and children and the said City J. Powell to act as trustee for his wife and children in the management of the money. He desires that his Sons Henry J. Powell and Christopher M. Powell as his Executors without giving bond and security in Court as Executors. He wants them to sell the property at once and in what ever terms they may think best. memory, for which I thank God and calling to mind the uncertainty
of human life and being desirous to dispose of all such worldly Estate
as it hath pleased God to bless and give me, I give and bequeath to my
daughter Rebecca Ann Shelling, a certain boy fifty linen or by the
name of flage Betty and Fanny and Sugar Bush.
Duly I give and bequeath to my daughter Abigail Elliott and her and
her issue one Cote and cap, few hair of that one gray shawl Colored Robe
and Girdle and pair of Garters I give and bequeath to my second Son to wit
Albert G. Elliott, Richard H. Elliott, James A. Elliott, John H. Elliott
and Edw. H. Elliott all of my lands to be equally divided between them.
I give and bequeath to my Son James A. Elliott John H. Elliott
and Edw. H. Elliott one horse, saddle & bridle each as they become of
of age my third and year of age the saddle which James A. Elliott
now has to be his and not entitled to an other. 5th I give and bequeath
to my five Son above named all of my stock of any description my
household and kitchen furniture also my wagon and grain and
farming utensils. 6th I give and bequeath to my Son William B. Elliott
one hundred dollars when my Son Edw. H. Elliott arrives to twenty
and year of age which money shall be paid out of the part of my
five Sons. I appoint the Court not to require Security of my Execution
I do not wish any appraisement of my property, whatever and, Lastly,
I do hereby constitute and appoint my Son Albert G. Elliott
Executor of this my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all
other or former Wills or Testaments by me heretofore made. In testimony whereof
I have written this my last Will and Testament my Seal this 30th day of
December 1846.
