

I, Charles Stuart - being of sound mind and disposing memory do make this my last will & testament hereby revoking all former wills & testaments, I will that my executor hereinafter mentioned shall pay all my just debts & carry into effect this my will & testament. Item first, I will & bequeath to my son in law Ludwell A. Foot twenty one hundred dollars in specie in consideration of his having taken a laborous & dangerous journey to Texas for me & with the understanding that he should live with him the balance of my life. Item second, The balance of my pecuniary means after paying all necessary expenses to be divided equally between my daughter Mary, Anna Humphrey & my son Charles Henry Stuart. Item third, I give & bequeath to my daughter Susanah P. Foot, my trunk, Pistol & Watch as keepsakes as having been the property of my son John B. Stewart who was killed in the Confederate Army. Item fourth, I give & bequeath to my grandson Edwin Foot, my shot Gun & saddle. Item fifth, I hereby appoint Ludwell A. Foot my executor to carry this my last will & testament into effect & take charge of the legacy untill called for by the legatee.
