In the Name of God Amen. I George Seaton of Buchanan Co and
State of Kentucky being of sound mind but knowing the certainty of death
and the uncertainty of the time I may happen and for the purpose of settling
my worldly affairs do make and Ordain this my last Will and Testament hereby
revoking all others by me heretofore made in the following manner (Viz) -
I prescribe I desire that my just debts and funeral charges be paid and satisfied
I give and bequeath to John Miller who married my daughter Margaret and father
of my late and now deceased son, I give and bequeath to my Grandson Thomas Seaton
my young boy named John, all the rest and residue of my Estate I give and
bequeath to my Son John H. Seaton but if it should so happen that he should die
before his wife it is my desire and will that she may keep said property in her
possession so long as she may remain his widow to assist her in raising and educating
his children, but she is not to commit any part of the same but on care of her
marriage or committing death then it is my desire that the same be equally divided
amongst his then surviving children. Lastly I constitute and appoint my Son
John H. Seaton as Executor to this my last Will and Testament. Signed Sealed and
delivered in presence of us.

Glopcock the following property to wit two negro boys and named Harrison & the other Blay and also the child that my negro woman Joyce is with at this time to be his during his life time and then to be divided to his children I give I bequeath to my son in law John H. Bailey and the heirs of William Glopcock my son now deceased my negro woman Joyce and her heirs if any after the and above named to be equally divided and half to go to John H. Bailey and the other half to William Glopcock's heirs I give I bequeath to my Son John O.B. Glopcock at the death of my wife Mary all my house hold & kitchen furniture & personal effects in fact all my property except the above named woman lastly I name my son John O.B. Glopcock Executor to my will as follows my hand and Seal this 20th day of April 1842.
