I give to my three boys Christopher, Isaac, and John the farm in the valley buy them paying of the two thousand dollars in one and two years three years to pay it without interest and if they wont take the farm at that my testator will put it up and sell it just between my sons.

I desire that my executor make the infant and equal in part of their detour detour with those that have already that has inured and left me one off off against what they have already received,

After pay all just debt, and funeral expense paid the balance to be equal divided between all my ans accept that which Christopher, Isaac and John pays for that farm then not entitled to no part of it goes to Francis, Susinda, George, Isaac, Mother, Isiah, Sister Ann if they take it at that price have no part in but every thing else equal,

Lastly I do hereby appoint and constitute my son Edward F. Pile Executor of my last will and testimony hereby revoking all other former will or testaments heretofore made by me heretofore made in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and
