said Will lie within Breckinridge County it is therefore considered and
ordered by this Court that the said Will be admitted to record the due
execution of the same being duly proved to the satisfaction of this Court

In the name of God amen I Thomas Alory of Breckinridge County being in
a very low state of health but of disposing mind believing now long I shall come
to a final dissolution and wishing to make such disposition of the little property
I now possess as appears to me to be best for my wife and children do make and
ordain this my last Will & testament. First that all my just debts be paid
secondly that my beloved wife Henrietta have and keep all my estate both
real and personally of every description in her hands for the support of herself
and my children during her widowhood and if at any time she should
think it most advisable to act according to law with my estate I wish her
to do so and at her decease or sooner if it enters her. The one hundred and two
of land on which I now live to descend and to be equally divided between my two
sons Thomas H Alory and Luke Alory forever and I do hereby nominate and
appoint my beloved wife Henrietta my whole and sole executrix of this my last will and
testament and as my debts are few and small and arrangements made to meet most of
them I do not wish my wife to make sale of any of my property unless she should find it
necessary to the payment of debts or not profitable to keep at her own discretion for the
support of herself and the children In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my
hand and seal this 25th day of February 1820
