

Now all men, by their presents that I Jacob Gilbert of the County of Buckenridge and State of Ky, being of sound mind and disposing memory, do make this my last will and Testament, revoking all others, 1st After paying my just debts, and funeral expenses, It is my will and desire: that my daughter Minna Ann Cox shall have, and I hereby will and bequeath to her and her heirs ninety six acres of land, being the same I had surveyed for my son William Gilbert, and the same on which he now lives, which land I estimate at four hundred dollars, and it is further my will and desire that my Executor pay to my daughter Minna, aforesaid one hundred dollars making the devise above five hundred dollars, to wit: the land four hundred, and the bal. one hundred as above,

It is further my desire that my Executor, pay to my grand children, children of my son Aquilla Gilbert, to wit: Chaney, Sarah, Eliza, Jane and Aquilla Gilbert, each, one hundred dollars, to make their fathers portion of my estate equal to my daughter, Minna Ann Cox.

I will and bequeath to my son Wm Gilbert the tract of land on which, Swick now lives being the ballance of the land, I bought of Christopher Hall, after taking out the ninety six acres heretofore devised by me to my daughter Minna Ann Cox, I further bequeath to my son William Gilbert aforesaid, my wagon and gear-
ing belonging thereto, in addition to the land heretofore devised him, the two devises above, being valued by me to him at five hundred dollars, making my three children as heretofore in sums of five hundred dollars each in money and property, valued by myself.

It is further my will and desire, that my executor dispose of the bal^y of my personal property left at the death of my wife Elizabeth, and divide the proceeds, after making up the devises to my daughter Minna Ann Cox, and the heirs of Aquilla Gilbert as above, equally, between my three children, one third to my daughter Minna Ann Cox, one third to William Gilbert, and one third to the heirs of my son Aquilla Gilbert.

It is furthermore my will and desire, that in consideration of the devise made by my son William Gilbert, that he take care of his mother, my beloved wife Elizabeth Gilbert, and that she is to have and control my entire personal estate during her life time for her own use and support, and - her death the one hundred dollars is to be paid to Minna Cox, and the devise to Aquilla Gilbert's heirs if not enough to do before. And furthermore it is my will and desire that my landed estate in the State of Iowa be sold when thought advisable by my Executor, and the proceeds divided as directed for the division of my personal property.

I hereby appoint my son Wm Gilbert Executor of this my last will and testament and fully empower him to make all necessary deeds and transfers which may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this my last will and testament.
