Will & Testament. I Will to Sam Priest the orphan I have raised one
cow and bed and furniture. I Will to my Grandson George Addis on my
youngest child and all the balance of my property consisting of Land
and Black Woman Mary, horses, butter, hogs, sheep, hound, select his town
furniture to my wife Rebecca Addison her life time for her comfort
and benefit and after her decease if she should be the longest liver
I Will for my estate to be equally divided amongst my children
with the exception of my son in law Thomas Arboff to him I will
three dollars out of my estate. In testimony whereof I do set my
hand and seal at this my last Will and Testament.

being of sound mind and disposing memory do make this my last Will
& Testament First, it is my Will that my Sons George and Henry shall
have my plantation and the old Survey of land of about 200 acres
also about 90 acres lying between said Survey and John Bates tract
It is my Will that my daughter Mary Patterson have the tract of land on
which she now lives, agreeable to a Survey made in her name of about
200 acres during her natural life and at her death the same shall belong to
her present children William and William and at what time in the
child above the Will & up as far as the corner of her present piece shows
a straight line to the nearest part of the Will's pond. It is my Will that
my Sons George & Henry do maintain their mother comfortably during her
life. It is my Will that at the balance of my estate real and personal after the
payment of my debts be equally divided between my children. Given under my

I desire to be sold and equal division made between all my children.
I have no claim on my Son Stephen McCoy property. This the 5th day of
August in the year of our Lord 1845
