In view of the uncertainty of life and being now of sound mind and memory I now make this my last will and Testament hereby revoking all others which I may have made. In the first place, I will that my wife Katherine Shaw have, my entire farm embracing the three separate tracts of which it is composed during her life. I will also that she have the ^{one} ~~and~~ third part of all the balance of my estate & that the remaining balance of my estate be equally divided among my six children namely: Nancy Jane Biddle, Martha Keys, Sarah Collins, Rebecca Barker, William Shaw & John Shaw; after the death of my wife as aforesaid I will that my land be sold and the proceeds thereof be equally divided among all my children as aforesaid I also will that my executor make a sale of my personal property after attaining to my wife her one third part and after paying all my just debts to divide as aforesaid among my children the proceeds. I nominate as my executor William Head of this county to carry into effect this will. In witness whereof I have hereunto subscribed my name in presence of the undersigned made before signing

In the name of God Amen, I James Harrel of Breckinridge County & State of Kentucky being now, in body full of sound mind & disposing memory do make this my last will and Testament:

1. First, I gave my soul to God from whom I received it
2. After my death I wish my body decently buried.
3. I will that after my burial that all my just debts be honorably paid out of my personal Estate.
4. I give to Patey Pool for a home & to John James Pool Patey Pool's son the following boundary of land, to be laid off out my tract of land wharvon I now live as follows, beginning on my line in the Cepuras lick hollow running in an East westerly direction to where there is a small branch falls over a cliff, thence up the said branch one hundred & 20 yards to a stake thence another East direction 226 yards to pine thence a strait line to limestone spring at the foot of a small — the course to be continued one hundred & fifty yard a head the said spring to a corner hereafter to be made thence a strait line to my line running down the Cepuras lick branch thence with my line down the Cepuras lick branch to the beginning I will that the above described tract of land be a home for Patey Pool during her natural life and at her death I give it to her son John James Pool to him & his heirs forever.

5. I will that all the rest of my estate both real and personal be equally divided between my brother's & sister hereafter named

Alfred Harrel one share Daniel Harrel one share my sister
Ann being one share William Harrel one share to them & their
heirs forever & I do authorize my Executor to deed the land in
this will lastly I appoint my brother Alfred Harrel my
Executor, Witness my hand this 4th day of April 1863.
