In the Name of God amen. I James Quiggins of the County of Buchanan & State of Kentucky, being now sitting in bodily but of sound mind & disposing memory calling to mind the uncertainty of mortal life & knowing that it is appointed unto all men kind once to die, Therefore for the better for my temporal affairs do make and ordain this my last Will & Testament in the following form to wit, First I recommend my Soul to God who gave it & my body to the earth to be buried Secondly As to my worldly goods my Will is that my Wife Anne to have the same to support and at my estate both real & personal for during her natural life time to the discharge of any funeral expenses & the payment of my just debts during her widowhood, and in case she should marry I do leave my property equal divided between my children. And as I am but little I request of the Court that they do not require security of said my Wife executor believing she will discharge her duty. This is my last Will and do declare this to be my last Will & Testament. In witness whereof I do affix my hand & Seal this 13th of May 1844.

I, William Compton of the County of Buckenridge and State of Kentucky being of sound mind and disposing memory do make this my last Will & Testament First, it is my Will that my Sons George and Henry shall have my plantation and the old Survey of land of about 200 acres also about 40 acres lying between said Survey and John Bates tract. It is my Will that my daughter Betsy Patterson have the tract of land on which she now lives, according to a Survey made in her name of about 200 acres during her natural life and at her death the same shall belong to her present Children Penning and William except what lies under the cliff above the mill & up as far as the corner of her present forced home a straight line to the nearest part of the mill pond. It is my Will that my Sons George & Henry do maintain their Mother comfortably during her life. It is my Will that at the balance of my estate real and personal after the payment of my debts be equally divided between my Children. Given under my hand & Seal the 5th day of December 1843.
