Wife is for her support and to ade he to scort and raise our children and I do heartly appoint her together with my son Godfrey W Taylor esq & co of this my last will and testament and I also appoint my Wife Mrs Fatty Taylor whole sole guardian of our infant children during her life & then to the care of my son Godfrey W Taylor, and as I am not conscious of being in debt more than my property will amply pay I request that the loof who may receive this note of this will not require security of my co or esq who name but will permit them to qualify without security, I heartly revoke all former wills by my heartly made in testimony whereof. I have heartly set my hand & seal this the 18 day of January 1845
