

I Micajah Powell of Buchanan's County and State of Kentucky, knowing the uncertainty of this life and the certainty of death, do make this my last Will and Testament as follows to wit: Having given to my Sons and to my daughter, Malinda Childers Wife of Henry P. Linder what I consider their fair part of my estate, it is my Will that after my death neither of them shall have any part or portion of any nor any claim thereon whatever.

1st I give and bequeath to my daughter Francis Ann a tract of land containing by estimation 4000 acres part of the tract that I now live on and bounded as follows to wit: Beginning at a stone in Springwood Marsh line and go from thence his corner thence South 82° W 38 poles to a stake thence S 86° E 44 poles to a black walnut corner possession thence S 24° W 76 poles to a Hickory & White oak bark thence S 86° E 36 poles to an ash and gum and dogwood in a line of the original Survey thence with the same N 28° E 126 poles to a stake and stone at the the mouth of the same corner to Springwood Marsh thence with the line N 65° W 78 poles to the Beginning. To her the said Francis Ann her heirs and assigns forever. 2^{ndly} The residue of the farm I now live on I devise to my infant grand daughter Fanny Powell infant daughter of Mary Ann Powell deceased with the following proviso to wit that should the said Fanny Powell die without having a living child or children then and in that event the same is to be sold and go to the whole of my heirs as they shall then devise and out of the avails of the sale & should die the Land in that event her sale is to be void & pass the title and with this further proviso that if my wife Fanny live longer than I do this devise is not to take place until after her death. She is not to be disappointed until she dies 3rd It is my Will and devise that should I die before my wife Fanny Powell she is to have the whole use and benefit of that part of my farm devised to our grand daughter Fanny Powell during her natural life and all the rent and avails of my estate both real and personal for her use and support during her life and that that part that may be necessary to be sold to pay my debts & funeral expenses, and whatever of my estate may be necessary at the death of my wife. It is my Will and devise that the same may be equally divided among my four daughters to wit: Polly Linder Wife of Joel Linder, Sally Childers Wife of George Childers, Francis Ann & Malinda Childers Wife of William Childers. But I have no more to the said William Childers the sum of \$500 that amount with the interest from the 1st of April 1838, the time I acknowledge it is to be taken out of my daughter Malinda Childers part as that shall appear.

It is my Will that my slaves and personal ^{estate} property be inventoried and appraised according to law but not sold except what may be necessary to be sold to pay my debts and funeral expenses & such as my heirs may choose to sell. I have by public and declare this to be my last Will and Testament nothing at former Wills. Signed Sealed &

McKay have this day (to wit 28th Nov) having been together by John Powell of Buchanan Co Ky to covenant to writing, and attesting the his last Will and Testament. The said John Powell being sound in mind and of disposing memory. He desires that his wife Mary Powell, ^{in law} have her dower out of the lands given to include the dwelling house and out houses. He also desires that his wife Mary Powell shall have her dower of Slaves such as she may select, and all the balance of his property to be sold and the proceeds to be used for the payment of his funeral expenses and just debts. After the payment of his debts he wishes his Son Thomas C. Powell to have an amount of money equal to the amount given to his Son Henry J. Powell and Christopher M. Powell. He also desires after his Son Thomas C. Powell shall have received an amount equal to the amount given to Henry J. Powell and Christopher M. Powell that this Son Henry J. Powell, Christopher M. Powell and Thomas C. Powell shall each have an amount equal to the amount given to City J. Powell. Then if any thing is left to be equally divided between my said City J. Powell part to be given to his wife and children and the said City J. Powell to act as trustee for his wife and children in the management of the money. He desires that his Sons Henry J. Powell and Christopher M. Powell as his Executors without giving bond and security in Court as Executors. He wants them to sell the property at once and in what ever terms they may think best.
