Known All Men by these presents that I Robert Chambliss of the County of Breckinridge and State of Kentucky do Make and Constitute this My last will and testament hereby revoking all others 1st After the payment of all of My just debts and funeral expenses, it is My Will and desire that My beloved wife Ruth shall have all of My property both real and personal during her Natural life except if I should fail to give to My Grand Sons Jasper and Columbus Marlow a house each during My life then it is My Will and desire that My executor shall out of My personal property give to them at their coming at the age of twenty years a good house apiece or one hundred dollars in Money as they may elect

2^d After the death of My wife I Give & bequeath to My youngest Son Henry Chambliss all of My real estate also old Slave Man Lewis and one hundred dollars in Money to be Made out of My personal estate provided however that if Slavery is ever abolished in Kentucky or by the Laws of the State a Slave Can be emancipated and Allowed to remain in the State then it is My Will & desire that the aforesaid Lewis shall be liberated & forever set free from Slavery & that the above sum of one hundred dollars bequeathed to My Son Henry be paid to the said Lewis for his Maintenance

3^d I Give & bequeath to My two Sons Robert B & Henry Chambliss the residue of My estate including My Negro Woman Nancy & her bay foal to be equally divided as between them in any way that they may see proper

I hereby appoint & Constitute My two Sons Robert B & Henry Chambliss My executors to this My last will and testament Was signing them to be Secretary to certify as such

I Henry Walker of the County of Breckinridge and State of Kentucky being advanced in life and Convinced of the uncertainty of its Continuance and of the necessity of Making such Preparation as I deem Expedient for its termination do Make & Ordain in this My last Will and Testament viz 1st It is My Will and Desire that all My just debts be paid 2nd It is My Will now Deceased that My Beloved wife Elizabeth Walker to have equally the third of them & a Gap filled on the form by Helen B. Walker and Jerome Beaman agreeable to the Lease Made by me to them during the continuation of said Lease

3rd I Will that My wife have and dispose of all My house hold and Kitchen furniture as she chooses I have about Four hundred and fifty dollars in Cash and Cash Notes I Will that My Beloved wife have the Cash and Notes above named for her Support during her Natural life after her death what she May have of the above Property to be Equally divided between all My Children I make one Heir born which I Will and bequeith to Gordon A Walker My Grand Son
