

I William McGlothlin, being in feeble health, but of sound mind and disposing memory make and publish this as my last will and testament,

After the payment of all my just debts, and funeral expenses, - I will and bequeath to my beloved wife Melvinia, and to my son Edward, R. my only living child all of my estate of every kind and description, both real and personal, to have and to use it for their support and benefit, during their lives, to have and to hold the full and complete title, to the same with full power to sell and convey the title to all or any portions of it, if they or either of them that may survive the other may believe it best to do so carefully investing the proceeds in such manner as they may deem best calculated to preserve and increase my estate, - using such portion only as may be necessary for their support at the death of either of them it my will and desire that the whole of my estate shall, at the surviving during his or her life, at the death of both of Edward R. leaves no lawful child, or children living, I will and bequeath the whole of my estate in trust to Henry B. Stearns to be used in the promotion of the care of education, with this general direction as to the mode and manner to which I desire it to be applied, - the whole of my estate to be collected together, - the principal to remain a permanent fund and to be safely and profitably invested, the interest of which is to be forever used, to establish and support in the town of Union Star a free school for the education of such children as may from time to time be sent to the school, Believing in the doctrines of the Methodist Church of which I am a member, and feeling that the cause of religion ought to be sustained, I desire that out of ~~my~~ the proceeds of the trust fund herein created that the trustee annually pay the sum of Ten Dollars towards the support of the Methodist Church at Union Star

If the trustee herein appointed should decline to act or die before my wife or son Edward R. I request a court of Chancery to appoint a suitable person to carry out the provisions of my will. -

I appoint my son Edward R. McGlothlin my executor and having ~~been~~ confidence in his honesty and integrity - I request the Court not to require security of him.
