I, John Gibson of Irvington, Breckinridge County Ky, being of sound mind and memory, and considering the uncertainty of life, do therefore make ordain publish and declare this to be my last will and testament, that is to say.

FIRST: To equalize the sons of my daughter, Margaret E. Parks, deed, Viz; Wilbur R. and Harold Parks, with former distribution to my other heirs in which they did not participate, I bequeath Twenty Six Hundred Dollars, \$2600.00 and I further designate J.B.
