

# Will of Annie Bruce

Easter, Kentucky, Feb. 9, 1919

Know all men, that I Annie Bruce, knowing the certainty of death and being in my right mind make this my last will. I do most earnestly will all my property of every kind both personal and real estate to my son Vernon H. Bruce, to have and to hold for his use and benefit under the following conditions, that the following party is to manage all of the property to the best of his ability for the use of my son, Vernon H. Bruce, and it is my will that the said Gilbert Pike is to have the control of property without being required to give any bond whatever. It is my will that the said Gilbert Pike is not to at any time to let my son Vernon Bruce have at any time any more money than it is necessary for him to have the necessities of life. I mean by the necessities of life enough to buy him, plenty of food and raiments.
