

Hartinsburg, Kentucky July 23, 1918

I, James Frank of Hartinsburg, Ky; declare this to be my last will & Testament revoking any other that I may have made.

FIRST. I desire that all my just debts be paid.

Second, the residue of my property I will and bequeath to my son, Orval Frank. This includes all of my property of every kind, Character or description

I will said property to my son said son, Orval Frank, to the exclusion of my other children for the sole reason that I have lived with him for the last ten or twelve years and he has looked after and cared for me during said time. I feel that my other children who knew this to be a fact, will not feel that I intend to or have done an injustice to any of them.

I name my son, Orval Frank, Executor of my estate without Bond.

I acknowledged the above to be my will and the same was written at my direction and at my request, and I have signed my name thereto in the presence of Eliza Miller and D.D. Dewell as attesting witnesses and they have signed their names thereto as such in my presence and in the presence of each other.
