I, Willis G. Hardin, of Breckinridge County, Kentucky, being of sound mind and memory, do make, publish and declare this to be my will and testament, to-wit:

First. - All my just debts and funeral expenses shall be first fully paid.

Second. - I give, devise and bequeath all the rest, residue and remainder of my estate, both real and personal to my beloved daughter Ethel L. Basham, to have and to hold to her, my daughter, and to her heirs and assigns forever.

Third. - I devise that my Executor herein after mentioned shall have power to sell and convey my "mill property" on Sinking Creek together with about fifty acres of land, proceeds ^{from} sale of said property to be applied to payment of my said just debts. Also two other tracts of land joining my "home place", known as the Alexander lease, and one hundred acres more or less, bought by me and my son in law Clarence Basham from Bate Harbison, all of said land in Breckinridge County, Ky. If the above mentioned lands are not sufficient to pay my just debts, then my Executor shall sell a sufficient number of acres off my home place, adjoining last two named tracts, to pay said just debts.

Fourth. - I nominate and appoint my son in law jointly with his wife, Clarence Basham, and Ethel L. Basham my sole Executors, of this, my last will and testament, hereby revoking all other wills heretofore by me made.
