Jordan as is hereafter described having borrowed of my wife on the 20th day of July 1876, \$600⁰⁰ dollars to pay off a note that I had given to Nelson Olymont, his wife wish note as will be seen bears interest from date with the following credits namely \$130⁰⁰ paid on the 29th day of January, 1875 - with a statement all on the note as follows but paid up to March 20th 1882 two hundred fifty three dollars fifty cents all on one note of \$300⁰⁰ dollars dated March the 5th 1881 which I borrowed of my wife to pay on my land my wife is now the holder and owner of both notes & to secure her in the payment of said note she is to have a lien on my entire real estate - and at the death of my wife my son W^m S. Jordan is to have out of said notes the sum of \$1200⁰⁰ dollars - the remainder on said notes to be equally divided between my two daughters above mentioned in this will - my wife is to have and occupy my residence & to have free and unlimited use of all my property as a home for her & her support - having full confidence in my wife I appoint her my executrix with the will annexed and request the Court not to require security of her this 20th day of March, 1894.

This leaves 500 acres of my home place out of which my other children viz Annie Burke James W. Miller and Nannie Lesieur is to be made equal to Matthias and Charles M. with same title as theirs in case I should die before my wife there will be found in the safe at B.F. Plank our marriage contract that will explain how to divide my personal property.
