 and knowing that it is appointed for all persons to die
 do hereby proclaim this my last will and Testament
 In the name of God I cheerfully yield up and
 give my soul to my God whom it may please him to
 require it the service where it originated according to
 my belief. My body I wish to be buried according to
 the usages of my country and the expenses it may
 occasion to be paid out of my property. I wish my just
 debts to be paid. Hence after my death I do hereby will
 and bequeath the plantations on which I now live in
 the County of Bullitt on Crooked Creek to my grandson
 Richard Deats who is son to my son John Deats.
 Hence after my death I do hereby will and bequeath to
 my grand daughter Catharine Suttelbarger who is
 daughter to my daughter Nancy Suttelbarger my
 lightward bed and bed clothing and two galled kettles and
 Shells and one and one half kettles. Hence after my
 death I will and bequeath to my Grand daughter Mary
 Deats who is a daughter to my son John Deats one
 pined cow and table and sugar chest and bread cupboard
 and even one Twenty Gallon kettle. Hence after my
 death I will and bequeath to my grand son David
 Suttelbarger who is son to my daughter Nancy Suttelbarger
 one and one half kettles and what heaps there
 may be. Hence after my death I will and bequeath
 to my grandsons John Suttelbarger and Jacob Suttelbarger
 one clock. Hence after my death I will and
 bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Dastly my bundle
 of cloth. Hence after my death I wish all my clothing
 to be distributed by my Grand daughter Catharine
 Suttelbarger who is daughter to my daughter to
 my grand daughters Catharine Hart and Eliza
 Hart. I do hereby retain and appoint my Grand
 son Richard Deats my Executor without being
 compelled to give other bond or security to carry into full
 execution the last will and last Testament. My dear

 to this my will and that my little property may be
 fairly and honestly distributed as herein do say
 It is not among the most important points of my
 will that there should be harmony and concord
 among you not only respecting this little estate

Will

I Thomas Wells of the County of Bullitt and State of
Kentucky make this my last Will and Testament in the
manner following that is to say
1st I give to my wife Mary Wells all my estate real
and personal during her life & whosoever with the exceptions
hereafter named, but should she marry again she will be
entitled only to her thirds. 2nd I give to my son James Wells
a farm lying on the road leading from Louisville to Nashville
being the land of purchase of Mr. Saunders - 3rd I
give to my son William Wells the farm on which I now live
reserving a room in the dwelling house for the use of any
two youngest daughters viz. Margaret Ellen and Martha
until so long as they remain unmarried, but my sons
James and William are not to have possession of the farms
herein devised to them during the life of my wife without
her consent, and neither of my sons aforesaid shall have
the right of selling the farms herein devised to them until
after the age of twenty five years. 4th I give to my
daughter Eliza Buntlinger (and to descend to her children)
a negro woman (Mentia) now in her possession and a
negro woman named Caroline, but she is not to have possession
of the last named negro until after the decease of my
wife. 5th I give to my daughter Camilla Buntlinger a
negro man named Henry to descend to her children and
five hundred dollars in cash, the said negro to remain in
her possession of my wife during her life, the five hundred
dollars to be paid over to her as soon as convenient after my
decease. 6th I give to my daughter Rebecca Bates a
negro woman named Rose and five hundred ^{dollars} in cash, the
said negro to remain in the possession of my wife during
her life, and the five hundred dollars to be paid over to her
as soon as convenient after my decease. 7th I give to my
daughter Martha Ann a negro man named Patrick

and a negro child named Jack, but not to come into her possession
until after the decease of my wife. The aforesaid negroes to descend to her
living heirs. 8th I give to my daughter Margaret Ellen a negro man
named John and a negro child named Richard to descend to her living
heirs, but not to come into her possession so long as my wife lives.
9th Should any of the negroes aforesaid die before they come into
the possession of the several devisees such negro or negroes so
dying shall be valued by two disinterested persons to be chosen
by life and the value of such negro or negroes dying at the
time of their decease, shall be paid out of my estate to the person
or persons to whom they were devised, each of my children pay-
ing an equal proportion to be paid after the death of my wife.

10th I give to my grandson John Thomas Kirkhite a negro
boy named ~~by name~~ Lewis to remain in the possession of
my wife until the said Thomas Kirkhite shall arrive at
the age of twenty one years, but should my wife die before
the said Thomas shall be twenty one years old the aforesaid
negro boy to come into the possession of Camilla Buntlinger
and remain with her during the minority of my aforesaid
grandson and should the said Thomas die without
living heirs the negro herein devised to him shall be the
property of the said Camilla Buntlinger and her children.
11th My will is that what debts I may owe to paid by the
sale of so much stock as may be sufficient to pay them, and
the residue of stock and all my household and kitchen
furniture farming utensils &c. and to remain in the possession
of my wife during her life and after her decease to be equally
divided among my children. I appoint my wife Mary Wells
 executrix and my son James Wells executor of this my will.
