And do for my body my will and desire is that it may be buried in a decent
and Christian like manner and all my just debts paid by Basil Summers
and his mother Mary Ann Summers and as for my worldly goods God has been
pleased to bless me with I give and bequeath in the following manner to wit.
I give unto my loving wife Mary Ann Summers and Basil Summers my
one my plantation wherein I now live and all my land with its appurtenances
that belongs to it and in a word all I possess in the world to be their for ever
except the following legacies I give to my children out of the above estate or to be
made up and paid to them in one or two Years as follows. I give unto my son
Richard Summers One Dollar and no more I give unto Charles Summers
One Dollar of my estate and no more I give unto Polly Weakley One Dollar
of my estate and no more I give unto Matilda Summers One dollar of my
estate and no more I give unto Rose Summers One dollar of my estate and
no more I give unto Rachael May One dollar of my estate and no more I
give unto Emma Summers my son one dollar and no more I give unto Penny
Summers Five Dollars and no more of my estate the above estate as is my

Will to leave in the hand of my loving wife and my son Basil for the use of
wife and the said Basil Summers is not to sell or waste any of my estate with
out the consent of his Mother my wife nor the Mother is not to be allowed to sell
or give away any part of the estate without the consent of her son Basil
Summers and also there is a Note in my hands which calls for One hundred
Dollars on William Brown that Note if ever collected it is my will that Fifty
dollars of that Note shall be Penny Summers and other fifty dollars to be divided
and his Mother, and my loving wife is to hold the above estate as long as
she remain my widow or until death, then the whole estate belongs to my
son Basil Summers forever as declaring this only to be my last will and
Testament as witness my hand and seal this 3rd of March 1826.

First after paying my funeral expenses and just debts I do desire that
what estate I have shall be disposed of as follows. First I bestow the Note of
my son Basil Brown for four Hundred dollars and perhaps he is indebted
to me something besides I do hereby desire and release the same to him
and acquit him from all liability on that account or for an account of any
thing else. I do also a Note or Notes upon my son in law Thomas Wilson
the precise amount not now recollect and he may be indebted to me otherwise I do desire and release the same unto him and acquit him of all
liability. 5th With what money may be due me from other persons,
and the money coming to me from Maryland which I have and do
honestly employ and authorise Capt. Wickliffe to collect; I desire to be
vested in the purchase of a Negro or Negress and when the same be so
bought I will the said Negro or Negress to my daughter Ann Wilson during
her natural life and after her death to her children now living and such of
them as may be living at her death that is to all as well those now in being
as any which they may hereafter have. It is my further desire that if ever
my son Basil shall be himself able that he shall give to my grand son
John to him the money which he owes me and from the payment of which
to my representatives I have released him hereby appointing him my
last guardian to his son John to him or that he shall educate him and
the same. It is also my further desire and request that my son in law
Wilson if he shall be able to do shall pay over to my son John
Elizabeth Brown Wilson and Sarah Elizabeth Wilson

Brown to be the sole judges each in his own case. I give to my wife grand
daughter Elizabeth Brown my set of silver Table spoons. I also do hereby
release unconsolable and set free my old servant Alice and charge she live to become
helpless I desire my son Basile to such that she does not suffer for food and clothes.
I give to my son Samuel my house Bible. I give to my wife a woman who my
wife which I bought of her some time ago. I give to my grand daughter Lydia
Elizabeth Michie my Bed and furniture which I have at this time at her farther
I give to my grand Son Robert Michie my coll which I have hitherto given
to him. I give to Ann Miller my daughter my riding馬. Sometimes
ago apportioned to my daughter Margaret Michie the claim which I have
against the H. McCormac in controversy in Bullitt to wit the benefit of a Judge
which apportioned me by the Order of my late Husband Samuel Brown this
gift to also confirm. Whatever other property I may have I desire to be
equally divided between my four affectionate children Margaret Basile
Brown and Samuel. In testimony of this done and published as my last
Will and Testament I have in this 19th August 1825 signed the same and
caused it to be witnessed in my presence and at my request.
