Bullett County Court December Term 1824

On the motion of John Hugh adm'r of John Hugh dec'd
by James C. Buckenridge his attorney, and with the consent of Henry
Christman, McNeill and James Quick has personally viewed on Court
Richard P. Simmons Abraham Filds Samuel Hamback and William
Carrshall and hereby appointed Commissioners to lay off the portion of
the said land in la tract of land lying in Bullett County in the State
of Kentucky containing 500 acres now in the possession and occupancy of said
Quick & McNeill, by metes and bounds giving to the said John Hugh
one equal third part in quantity and value of the improved and un-
improved land in said tract: That is to say one equal third part in
quantity and value of the land in the possession and occupancy of said
Quick & McNeill, and one equal third part in quantity and value of that part of said
tract of land in the possession and occupancy of the said James Quick
and the said Commissioners are hereby required and directed to make

In obedience to an order of the Bullett County Court to us directed
on the undersigned Commissioners and on the 15 day of December 1824
proceed to lay off by actual survey the portion of John Hugh adm'r
of John Hugh deceased in a tract of land lying in Bullett County in
the State of Kentucky containing 500 acres now in the occupancy and possession
of John McNeill and James Quick - giving to the said John Hugh
the one third of the improved land and the one third of the unim-
proved land in the said 500 acres of land, estimating the same ac-
cording to its quantity quality and value thereof, on the following
manner and form viz: First the courses and distances of the said
500 acres of land - Beginning at two beech trees and a white oak
on the bank of the State fork corner of Nos 271 and tract, and running
thence N 75° E 58 poles to a stake in a cane, thence S 75° E 58 poles
to a stump and stake thence S 71° E 240 poles to two beech trees and a sugar
tree in the Peaceable line, thence with the same S 74° E 156 poles to the
white oaks, thence N 75° E 80 poles to another and sugar tree, thence
N 76° W 270 poles to the mouth of the branch called McNeill's thence
down stream with its meanders the following courses and
distances: thence S 81° W 108 poles, thence S 76° W 66 poles, thence N 75° W 10 poles

From Beginning at a stake, back trees and a white oak on the bank of Floyd's fork and running thence due north 17 poles to a stake, thence S 75 N 24 poles to a stake, thence S 65 N 12 poles to a stake, thence S 37 N 16 poles to a stake, thence S 44 W 36 poles to a stake, thence S 75 N 23 poles to a stake and back stump, thence S 38 W 64 poles to a stake on the bank of Floyd's fork, thence along the said fork ~~with~~ its several meanders and windings thence to the Beginning.

The course & distances of John Hugh's third part of John McDevell's ^{own} improved land making to the said John Hugh 68 aces of unimproved land and timbered as follows. From: Beginning at a white oak and running thence N 76 N 68 poles to a fruit gum and hickory, thence N 53 W 158 poles to the mouth of a branch called Millberry, thence S 76 E 37 poles to a sugar tree and ash, thence S 58 N 88 poles to the Beginning.

Notes & Explanation. No. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 &c. is the bound of the 568 aces of land. The Blue represents land Hugh's 76 aces of cleared land. The dotted line except the blue represents the

the same line between Quicks and John Hugh. The yellow represents Quicks' full Quicks' part of the cleared land. The red represents John Hugh's part of Quicks' timbered land. The green represents John Hugh's part of McDevell's timbered land. Given under our hands this day and date above written.

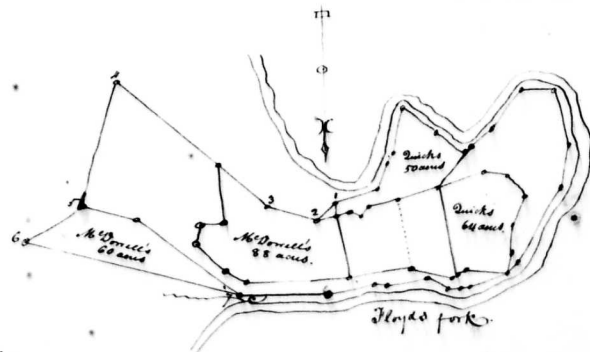

But by John McDevell's giving five poles - days to a lane running through his plantations for the purpose of said John Hugh's getting of a road to his short run cleared land - like laid off this says John McDevell's part of the - bered land to the said John Hugh at the upper end of said tract as will appear in said plat.
