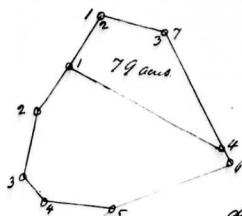

In obedience to an order of the honorable Bullitt County Court to us directed. We the undersigned Commissioners did on the 15th day of Sept. 1835 go in the lands of Walter deceased containing of two hundred and thirty nine acres and did then and there proceed to lay off by actual survey the dower of Mary Ellen Blandford widow and executrix of Walter Blandford deceased seventy nine acres of land including the mansion house garden &c. giving to the said Mary Ellen Blandford about one third of the improved land and about one third of the unimproved land we having had due regard to the quality and quantity of said lands and we make the annexed plat a part of our report. The courses and distances of the widow dower containing of seventy nine acres beginning at a stake in the original line and running thence North 39 degrees East 75 poles to the beach trees near the thence South 70° East 75 poles to the beach trees thence South 22° East

160 poles to the beach trees and a walnut tree. Thence North 57° West 216 poles to the beginning—

The 1. 2. 3. 4. 1. in red represents the 79 acres across the widow's dower.

The within having been done under an order of the Bullitt County Court thus directed to lay off the dower of Elizabeth Blandford wife & executrix of Walter Blandford deceased but her name having been mistaken, this as it is ascertained to be Mary Ellen Blandford the said lady being the wife & executrix of Walter Blandford deceased as attested to in the dower given under our hands this 21st day of September 1835.

Rufus Phelps, John C. Hornbeck, Chauncy R. Phelps, & Henry C. M. Carlisle being first sworn to and they are hereby appointed appraisers of the estate of Samuel Hornbeck deceased. Took the oath as appraisers of the estate of Samuel Hornbeck deceased as by law required. Witness my hand as justice peace of Bullitt County this 18th day of Sept. 1835.

The Inventory & appraisement of the estate of Samuel Hornbeck deceased made this 18th day of September 1835 at his late residence as shown to us by his administrators Isaac Hornbeck & John C. Hornbeck viz.

Arnold surveyor of said County who performed that duty, as will be seen by referring to the foregoing plat which is made part of this Report. Owing to the location of said land we found that we could not make a division of the land so as to be advantageous to the King and the said Rhoda Summery we directed fifty acres be laid off for said slaves which fifty acres include a clearing of timber and the same has been marked and will appear by reference to the plat made part hereof. Elisha Summery who married the said Rhoda attended to the plat and the allotment. Witness our hands, this 4th day of November 1829. A. Cook Clerk. Wm. F. Pope Secy.

At a County Court held for Russell County at the Court house in Shepherdsville on the 19th day of October 1835. An allotment of Brown of Rhodaphimery late Rhoda Rhodaphimery widow of Richard Rhodaphimery dec'd in the hands of said decedent was presented in Court by the Commissioners and at the instance of said Rhodaphimery their husband Elisha Summery ordered to be recorded. Whereupon I wrote to Summery Clerk of said Court do certify that I have recorded the within allotment of Brown in my office as required by law. Attest. Attest to Summery C. J. 266

Rhoda Summery { Mr. Henry Cook, William F. Hiller and George F. Pope Have of the Commissioners appointed by an order of the County Court of Russell County to assist to Rhoda Summery formerly Rhoda Rhodaphimery widow of Richard Rhodaphimery dec'd in the hands of said decedent make the following report as to the property, the being first known by Lewis L. W. Summery to a Justice of the Peace of said County. That the value of the negroes as follows Lewis at \$300, Betty at \$300, Mary five years old at \$175 & Harriet nearly 3 years old at \$100. We had to do this by the said negroes could not be equally divided & settled. We have allotted to the King, Lewis, Mary & Harriet and the negro Woman Betty to the said Rhoda Summery for her share and have allotted her to pay to the King the sum of \$8.33 1/3. Court in order to make the value of the young negroes equal to the value of Lewis & Betty all which is respectfully submitted. Witness our hands, this 26th day of November 1829. A. Cook Clerk. Wm. F. At a County Court held for Russell County at the Court house in Shepherdsville on the 19th day of October 1835. Allotment of Brown to Rhoda Summery wife of Elisha Summery late Rhoda Rhodaphimery widow of Richard Rhodaphimery dec'd in the hands of said decedent was presented in Court by the Commissioners and at the instance of said Brown many orders to be entered of Record. White's Will
Exam?

In the name of God Amen. I William White of Bul. Hill County in the State of Kentucky, being of sound mind, memory, and understanding, do make, ordain and declare this instrument to be my last will and testament, in manner and form following, that is to say, I give to my eldest son Richard White the plantation on which I now live containing one hundred and sixty five acres, enclosed with six hundred Dollars, being devised to him, which amount I have paid him for and take special care of his mother Susanah White during her natural life. I also leave my wife Susanah and feather bed and apparatus sufficient to clothe belonging. At a final settlement of my estate, my oldest daughter Nancy Whitcomb is to be charged with one negro girl named Kelly worth three hundred dollars, and one feather bed and saddle, which she has received in advance of my estate. My daughter Mary Summery is to be charged with one negro girl named Sarah worth two hundred dollars, a bed and saddle which she has received in advance of my estate. My daughter Elizabeth Monk is to be charged with one negro boy named Adam worth two hundred dollars, and bed and saddle, which she has received in advance of my estate. My daughter Eliza Martin is to be charged with one negro boy named George worth two hundred dollars, and bed and cow, instead of saddle, which she has received in advance of my estate. My son Levy is to be charged with one negro boy named Ray, worth two hundred dollars, and a horse, two saddles and a bed, at the price of eighty dollars, which he has received in advance of my estate. My son William P. White is to be charged with one negro boy named Nathaniel at the price of two hundred dollars, and one hundred dollars in cash, one horse at the price of eighty five dollars, and one bed which he has received in advance of my estate, which is the full amount he is to receive of my estate and no more. My son James White is to be charged with one yellow slave named Robert at the price of two hundred dollars, and one hundred dollars in cash, and one horse at the price of fifty five dollars, and one feather bed, which is the amount he has received in advance of estate which is the full amount he is to receive of my estate and no more. My daughter Maria Ralph is to be charged with one negro girl named Nelda, at the price of two hundred dollars and one bed which she has received in advance of my estate, which is the full amount she is to receive and no more of my estate. My son Richard White is to be charged with sundry cattle and hogs one mare two beds and furniture one cupboard and furniture therein belonging to, and corn and apparatus one wheat saw
