 and his mother Maryann Summers and as for my worldly goods God has been
 pleased to bless me with I give and bequeath in the following manner to wit,
 I give unto my loving wife Maryann Summers and Basil Summers my
 one my plantation whereon I now live and all my land with its appurtenances
 that belongs to it and in a word all I possess in the world to be theirs for ever
 except the following legacies I give to my children out of the above estate or to be
 made up and paid to them in one or two years as is as follows. I give unto my son
 Richard Summers One Dollar and no more I give unto Charles Summers
 One Dollar of my estate and no more. I give unto Polly Mackley One Dollar
 of my estate and no more. I give unto Matilda Summers One dollar of my
 estate and no more. I give unto John Summers One dollar of my estate and
 no more. I give unto Rachael May One dollar of my estate and no more. I
 give unto Thomas Summers my son one dollar and no more I give unto Bannay
 Summers Fifty Dollars and no more of my estate the above estate as is my

Will to have in the hand of my loving wife and my son Basil for the use of
 wife and the said Basil Summers is not to sell or waste any of my estate with
 out the consent of his Mother my wife nor the Mother is not to allow to sell
 or give away any part of the estate without the consent of her son Basil
 Summers and also there is a Note in my hands which calls for ten hundred
 Dollars on William Hume that Note if ever collected it is my will that fifty
 dollars of that Note shall be Bannay Summers and other fifty dollars to be paid
 and his Mother, and my loving wife is to hold the above estate as long as
 she remain my widow or until death, then the whole estate belongs to my

 the precise amount not now recollecting and he may be indebted to me other-
 wise I do desire and release the same unto him and acquit him of all
 liability. 3^d With what money may be due me from other persons
 and the money coming to me from Maryland, which I have and do
 hereby empower and authorize Robt. Wickliffe to collect; I desire to be
 vested in the purchase of a Negro or Negroes and when the same be so
 vested I will the said Negro or Negroes to my daughter then Million during
 her natural life and after her death to her children then living and such of
 them as may be living at her death that is to all as well those now in being
 as any which they may hereafter have. It is my further desire that if ever
 my son Basil shall feel himself able that he shall give to my grand son
 then to be born the money which he owes me and from the payment of that
 to my representatives I have released him hereby appointing him executor
 and guardian to his son John to know or that he shall educate him worth
 the same. It is also my further desire and request, that my son in law
 William if he shall ever be able to do so shall pay over to my grand daughter
 Eliza Ann Watson and Sarah Elizabeth Mack

 kaiser which I bought of her some time ago. I give to my grand daughter Lydia Ann
 Elizabeth Michliff my Bed and furniture which I have at this time at her father's
 I give to my grand son Robert Michliff my cott which I have heretofore given
 to him. I give to Ann Milson my daughter my riding Mare. Some time
 ago assigned to my daughter Margaret Michliff the claim which I have
 against the H. Melcombs in controversy in Bullitt to wit the benefit of a Judge
 court assigned me by the Order of my late Husband Samuel Brown this
 gift is also confirm. Whatev other property I may have I desire to be
 equally divided between my four affectionate children Margaret Bazel
 Ann and Samuel. In testimony of this done and published as aforesaid
 Will and Testament I have in this 19th August 1825 signed the same and
 caused it to be Witnessed in my presence and at my request.
