Will.

In the name of God amen I William Simmons, son of
Puliste County and State of Kentucky being weak in body
but of perfect mind and memory and calling to mind the
uncertainty of this life and that it is appointed by God for
all men once to die do make this my last will and test-
ament and which is as follows to wit.

1st I give my soul to almighty God who gave it to me.
 resting in the merits of my Saviour Jesus Christ for
 pardon and remission of all my sins at the last day;
 my body to be decently interred at the direction of my
 executors herein after named and as to my worldly
 goods that it has pleased almighty God to bless me with
 I give devise and bequeath in manner following to wit.
 I give to my beloved wife Eliza and Simons the plantation
 whereon I now live together with all the stock, household
 and kitchen furniture farming utensils and the following
 slaves to wit. Edward, Isaac, Tony, Esther, Hannah, Mary
 and Norris, (except such as I give to my son William
 and Simons and John Smith) all which I give to my
 beloved wife during her natural life, or widon hood.

it is my will and desire if she shall marry that the plantation I give to her shall upon her marriage vest in my son Willie and Simmons the ballance of the property given to her together with its increase to remain hers during her life and at her death to be equally divided and the One half thereof I give to my son Willie and Simmons and the Other half I give the use thereof to my daughter Lillie and her children during her life and at her death to her children and heirs of her body begotten and theirs forever. And I give to my son Willie and Simmons the plantation whereon Simon lived after the death or marriage of my wife which shall first happen as before mentioned. I also do give to my said son the following slaves and other property to wit. Seven barrel slaves to wit. Paine, Mary, Sarah, Netty, Miley, Lucy and Henry, and the increase of the females. also four horses three to be worth One hundred dollars each and the Other One to be worth fifty dollars and a Complete saddle and bridle, four feather beds and furniture. One of the bedsteads to be long posted with curtains and One Trunk bed without furniture. One bureau to be worth fifty dollars two tables to be worth ten dollars. One set of silver spoons. Soup spoon and sugar tongs four Cows and Calves, twenty four sheep, three live doing fowls. Eighteen dollars each. 1847

The table Cloths, three napier and three of linen to him
his heirs and assigns forever: Them I give to my daughter
Lelia Stone and her children the use of the following
negroes for and during her life to wit: Henry, Flora,
Lucy, Agnes, Kitty, Charity and Margaret, also
four horses three of which to be with one hundred
dollars each the other worth fifty dollars as good
saddle and bridle, also four feather beds and furniture
One of the bedssteads long posted, with a set of curtains
and Trundle bed, without furniture, One bureau worth
fifty dollars two tables worth ten dollars one set of
spoon with soup spoon and sugar long four Corn
and Cakes moulds four sheep three breeding, some Eighteen
dollars in Cash, One table Cloths three of deer
and three of linen all of which is now in his possession
and at his death then all and singular the property
aforesaid the use whereof is here in given to her and
her children to go to and live in her said children
and heirs of his body begotten and their heirs and
assigns forever. In testimony my beloved Wife Elizabeth
Emmons my executors and my beloved brother
Richard Emmons Executors of this my last will
and testament revoking all other wills heretofore
made by me. In testimony whereof I set my
hand and seal the 29th day of August 1822
