make and affirm this my last will and testament in the manner
and form following to wit.

First of all It is my Will and desire that all my just debts, be hence-
forth paid out of my estate - 2^d I give and bequeath unto
my beloved sons William, Andrew and William humbly, the
plantation Manor I now live, containing three hundred and
twenty three ams. to them and their heirs forever then and there
alike - 3^d It is my Will and desire that all the remaining part
of my estate of every description both real, personal and mixed
with two negro men named Paul & Peter be sold to the highest
bidder on Twelve months credit, for cash, and the money arising
therefrom to be divided in the following manner, To wit, William,
and Andrew Ruby, my two daughters shall have an equal
proportion then and there alike - also the legal heir of my daughter
Sarah Rouse, shall have an equal part, of said money, to be
arises at lawfull age or money - and to be paid to them as they may
my daughter Sarah Rouse, find William in hand money, to be
paid her out of my estate, and lastly I appoint my beloved son
William humbly, my executor to this my last Will and
testament which I revoke disannul and make void all other or
former Wills or testaments by me made, acknowledging this only as
my last Will to the 10th day of February and in the year of our Lord 1839.

of Kentucky, knowing that this is appointed for all men and to die and the uncer-
tainty of life and certainty of death and being of perfect mind and memory,
do hereby be to god for his mercies bestowing upon me, that made comfortable
and spirit this to be my last Will and testament part of all I
recommend my soul into the hands of almighty god that made it, and
my body to the earth to be buried in a decent Christian like manner, and
as to my worldly goods that It has pleased god to bless me with I give
and bequeath in the following manner and form first of all my, first
of all I give and bequeath to my son overall Whiting, two hundred and
twenty ams of land, the place where he now lives on, also one negro man
named Henry, and a negro woman named Maria - Then I give and bequeath
to my beloved son Thomas Whiting the place, he now lives, he now lives
of one hundred and eighty eight ams of land, also one negro man
named Peter, and a negro girl named Jane - Then I give and bequeath to my
beloved son John Whiting the plantation where he now lives consisting
of two hundred and four ams of land, also two negro men, one named
James and the other Jeff - Then I give and bequeath to my beloved
daughter Mary Whiting a negro woman named Ann, and all her
increase, except her eldest child Ann, I also give her three hundred
dollars in cash - Then I give and bequeath to my beloved daughter
Jane Brown one hundred and twenty seven ams of land, It being
half of the land that I intended for my son William Whiting and
divided by a stone line, from the poplar corner market St. from thence
to two hundred and thirty feet, also one negro girl named Charlotte
to her and all her heirs of her body - Then I give and bequeath to
my beloved wife Sarah Whiting one negro man named Benjamin, also
one negro woman named Milly during her remaining my Widow,
also I give her three of two of my Horses which shall be on hand
when I die, also one Woman's saddle & bridle which she now has
in possession, also Myson and girl that belongs to It, two places
two ams at two broad hors, also one hundred barrels of corn, and
fifteen hundred weight of pork, also my loom and girls belonging to
two living Whels, and pan of bards, also two cow Halls and all
the gear that shall be on the place, when I die, and hope to be
amount of five pounds, and then is to take all the bed
posts and all the furniture that she has, with her when I die
her, which was the estate of Richard Ruby, also the plantation
where I now live I give to my beloved wife It being one hundred
and twenty seven ams, the one half of the land that I intended
for son Whiting and during her remaining my Widow and
that appointed thereto - Then I also give to my beloved
daughter Ann Whiting the land above given to my son

The William Summers, Jas. Bowman and Benjamin Hughes, three of the
commissioners appointed by an order of the County Court of Bullock at their October
Term 1879. to divide the land on the South side of East river, belonging
to the estate of Jonathan Brown died, and to allot to Agnes Brown his Widow her
share thereof - Having been first duly sworn proceeded to make the allotment
of one tract of land, containing as appears from a deed, in the papers of the
said Agnes Brown, five hundred and thirty seven acres. And the said allot to the
said Agnes for her share, in the above said tract of 537 acres, one hundred and
fifty acres within the following bounds by beginning at a white oak, red oak,
elm and hick, stated in the deed to be beginning corner, on the North
side of Long Lake Creek, thence with the original line of 20 E. 88° 18' N. to two
small pines at the intersection of Brown's and Thompson's line, thence of 15°
150 feet to two pines and a red oak, thence of 57° 12' 26' 6" to the said corner,
on the North bank of Long Lake Creek, thence of the said bank with the
