The last will and testament of Robert Bayby, deceased, was on the 22nd day of May 1820 produced in Court and partly proved by the birth of Benjamin Northcutt, one of the subscribing witnesses thereto - and on the 26th day of June 1820 was again produced in Court and fully proved by the birth of Samuel Bylandt another subscribing witness thereto and ordered to be recorded - and on the motion of David Bayby the Executor therein named, who made oath thereto and together with Charles Bayby and William Hester his securities entered into and acknowledged their bond in the penalty of two thousand dollars, conditioned as the law directs. Certificate was granted him for obtaining a probate in due form. Given under my hand this 26th day of June 1820. Recorded in Will Book of folio 328.
