 of the County of Campbell and State of Kentucky
 being weak and in a low condition but thanks be to
 God in my perfect senses and soundness of memory
 thanks be to God for the same, I do hereby affirm
 this my last will and Testament: making all
 other wills by me made and after me made void
 and my desire is that all the worldly goods I possess
 I am possessed with may be disposed of in the
 manner to wit: I give I leave I bequeath to my
 acres of land lying on that part of my land
 the bear wallow which I desire my Executors may make
 him a title to them I give to my son Gerard fifty
 acres of land to be land of in any part of my
 land not touching my plantation
 I then I give my son Patrick fifty acres of land
 joining William Hume and my upper land
 I then I give to my daughter Sarah one cow and
 one bed wheck to her and her heirs forever
 Then I lend my wife during her natural life or
 used on her all the residue of my property
 together with my plantation an fifty acres joining
 the same and at her decease or marriage the land
 I give to my sons Patrick and John to be equal divided
 between them which I give to them and their heirs forever
 And lastly I appoint my two sons George & Elizabeth Exors
 of this my last will and Testament at my just decease
 the property in her hands to be equally divided amongst all
 my children

I Jofa York being in full Exercise of perfect

 of four miles. the Corner Begins at a white oak and runs
 up the branch a short east to my back line then goes
 with that line to the corner joining Leache line from
 thence to the white oak where it began - Second I give
 and Bequeath to my Grand Daughters Rachael and Isidell
 York one hundred Acre of land more or less Beginning at
 the same white oak and runs a straight line to two small
 Elms near main fence which makes the second corner from
 thence up the creek to Biggs Corner then a long Biggs line to
 a gum and poplar and from thence to the Beginning it is to be
 understood that this land sells to the Children left these Sons
 By Jofa York their Deceased father, Thirdly I give and
 Bequeath all the Rest of my land to my Sons Joshua and
 Jany York to be theirs after the Death of my self and my
 wife - Fourthly and lastly I leave all my moveable
 property to my wife Rachael to Dispose of at her will and
 pleasure after my Death so long as she remains a widow
 And I leave to my Eldest son Charles York one Shilling
 to my second son William Smith one Shilling
 to my third son Smith one Shilling Rachael York one Shilling
 Jofa York Deceased his heirs one Shilling each his
 Son

And I do hereby certify that I have a claim to one hundred
 acres of land lying on the North fork of Monongahela
 about a mile below the mouth of Sandy which is the in
 Morgan Tract to which I give my last testimony that I
 never sold Bargained nor made any conveyance nor
 power of attorney to any person until now I therefore
 make it my last will and Testament that my wife
