In the name of God Amen! I, Mary Kennedy of the County of Campbell
and State of Kentucky, being of sound mind and memory, do make Declares and Publish
this to be my last will and Testament in manner and form following, to wit: It is my
desire that after my just debts being just paid, that the legacies be paid as hereinafter
named.

I give and bequeath unto my grandson Samuel I Beale one negro girl
named Harriet to serve the said Samuel until she becomes thirty one years of age which
will be on the 17th day of May in the year 1838 and then to be emancipated and
set free, also eighty dollars in money.

I give and bequeath unto my grandson Benjamin B. Beale one negro boy
named Henry to serve the said Benjamin until he becomes thirty one years of age which will
be on the 15th day of October in the year 1838 and then to be emancipated and
set free - Also fifty dollars in money, and also one set of table spoons and one silver
cup spoon.

I give and bequeath unto my grandson Edwin I Beale one negro boy
named Samuel to serve the said Edwin until he becomes thirty one years of age
which will be on the 17th day of December in the year 1838 and then to be emanci-
pated and set free - Also twenty dollars in money.

I give and bequeath unto my grandson James I Beale one negro boy
named Edmund to serve the said James until he becomes thirty one years of
age which will be on the 27th day of September in the year 1841 and then
to be emancipated and set free - Also twenty dollars in money.

I give and bequeath unto my grand daughter Lucinda Beasley one
negro boy named Matthew to serve the said Lucinda until he becomes thirty
one years of age which will be on the first day of April in the year 1835
and then to be emancipated and set free.

I give and bequeath unto my grandson George M. Beale one hundred dol-
lars in money - And it is my will and desire that the money hereby devised to my said
grandsons, George, Benjamin, Samuel, Edwin and James, shall be paid to them out

Husband William Kennedy and which he left and in and by his last will
and Testament - It is my further will and desire that in case either of my
said grandsons should die without issue or heirs, that then and in that case
the property hereby devised to the deceased shall be equally divided between
my four grandsons, Benjamin, Samuel, Edwin and James or such of them as
shall survive.

It is to be understood that I have already allotted and given to my
daughter Ann Beasley that portion of my Estate which I intended for her.

I give and bequeath unto my grandsons Edwin I Beale and James I
Beale the balance of the money that may be due me from the Estate of
my late husband Wm Kennedy, and the balance of my Estate not here-
before devised and the money arising therefrom and due and as my
decease to be equally divided between them.

And I declare it to be my will and desire and intention that
the Negroes hereby devised shall qualify and serve their said several
terms of service in the State of Kentucky aforesaid and are not to
be removed out of said State in any prudent whatever process to
their emancipation.

It is my will and desire that the whole of the money and prop-
erty hereby devised to my four grandsons, Benjamin, Samuel, Edwin
and James, shall remain in the hands of my Executors, until my said
grandsons shall arrive at lawful age, with the further exception of as
much thereof as shall be necessary for their education and support; and
it is my particular desire that my Executors pay their attention to the same
and necessities of my grandsons Edwin and James while raising and educating
out of my Estate.

It is my will and desire that the last bequest that I have given to my grand-
sons, George, Benjamin, Samuel, Edwin and James, shall remain in the care of
Jonathan Beasmack, until they arrive at lawful age - Also that the balance
of my Estate that is not devised in this will to be sold, and after paying my
just debts the balance to be equally divided between my four grandsons, Edwin
and James.

I do hereby nominate Jonathan Beasmack, Solomon Brundage jun. Thos
as Damierin, Enoch Daniel, and William Thompson Sen. Executors to this my last
will and Testament hereby revoking all other wills heretofore by me made and
published. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 7th
day of May in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred twenty one.

The last Will and Testament of Mary Hunsley did was produced in Court and proved by the Oaths of James S. Lindsay and Samuel Prior two of the subscribing witnesses thereto and ordered to be recorded, which is accordingly done.

In the Name of God Amen! I Betsey Green of the County of Campbell and State of Kentucky being infirm in body, but of perfect sound mind and disposing memory and calling to mind the uncertainty of life and that it is appointed unto for all persons to die; And being desirous to make such disposition of all my worldly estate as it hath pleased God to bless me with and which I have a right by law to dispose of, in such manner as I deem most expedient and beneficial for those whom I desire may enjoy the same after my decease, do make this my last Will and Testament in manner following, Inprimis, I bequeath my soul to God who gave it me and my body to the dust from whence it came to be buried in a Christian-like manner at the discretion of my children. And Execution hereof mentioned.

Secondly- It is my Will and desire that all my just debts be paid out of my estate which I inherit of my brother John Green deceased.

Now I will and bequeath to my eldest son William Buff Green the sum of one dollar. The reason of my making such devise to him is owing to his great depredation and having made him considerable advances hitherto.

Now I will and bequeath to my daughter Betsey Buff Craig one hundred and twenty five acres of land with the appurtenances be the same more or less including my present dwelling house and described in the following miles and bounds, to wit; Beginning at a back and front between two iron woods corner to James Taylor thence N 30° E 280 poles to a large poplar and back in the Ohio bottom thence South 60° 71 poles to two small bushes and back eye corner to John Green thence S 30° West 280 poles to a stake at the intersection of the back line thence with said back line N 62° West 71 poles to the beginning. Also I will and bequeath to said Betsey & Craig, one Negro woman slave neatly together with all her present family of children and all their future increase to her the said Betsey her heirs and assigns forever.

Now I will and bequeath to my son John Green all the balance of my tract of land whereon I now live not hitherto disposed of- also one family of Negro slaves to wit; Dick and Riner his wife together with all their present family of children and all their future increase to him his heirs and assigns forever.

during her natural life my Negro woman slave Mary and also her daughter Melly together with their future increase- to be kept with said Betsey for the purpose of taking care of said Sally during her natural life- Also the sum of One thousand dollars for her support to be raised by my said son hereafter named out of the Estate which I derive from my deceased brother John Green- The Interest of which is to be applied for the support of the said Sally the same being voted in Bank stock or put out at interest as there hereafter mentioned shall think most beneficial.

Now I will and bequeath to my nephew Henry Green Smith the sum of One hundred dollars to be raised of the Estate which I derived from my deceased brother, as a testimony of my regard and affection for him.

Now I give and bequeath to Alfred Corder a horse to be valued at one hundred dollars also a saddle, saddle cloth and bridle to be worth twenty five dollars, to be purchased by my Executors hereafter named for the purpose of enabling said Corder to travel to preach the Gospel.

Now My Will and desire is that my old Negro woman slave shall enjoy her perfect liberty and freedom after my death and that my son John Green and my daughter Betsey & Craig should support her in ease and comfort, and I do will and bequeath to my said Negro Woman Slave the sum of Forty dollars for annuity during her natural life and to be paid early by my Executors.

Now. It is my Will and desire that all my stock of every description consisting of horses, hogs, cattle sheep &c. also all my farming utensils, household and kitchen furniture of every description, shall be sold at such prices as my Executors shall think proper; And it is further my Will and desire that my daughter Betsey & Craig have one half the amount of such sale and that the other half be added to the one thousand dollars hitherto set apart as a fund for the support of my said unfortunate daughter Sally P. Green. It is further my Will and desire that if in case that my daughter Betsey Craig's situation should permit of her taking and keeping her unfortunate sister Sally P. Green that she do so, but in case her situation should not permit her to take and keep her- then it is my most earnest request that said Betsey Craig will make proper provision and provide the most suitable place and see that she is taken proper care of- And it is further my Will and desire that the said Betsey Craig have the interest and take charge of the funds hereby appropriated for the maintenance of the said Sally P. Green and in case of the death or inability of the said Betsey to attend to the management of said charge, then it is my Will and desire and most earnest request that my relation John Green of Lincoln County and James Rankins of Mercer do
