

Went to Mr James McFarlane on Monday
the 4th day of Nov^r 1811 to sit up with him.
McFarlane who was at that time in a very
low state of health, the appeared from some
Conversation I had with him the next morning
to be in his proper senses, after breakfast I
walked out into the yard and was requested
by Mrs McFarlane to come into the house
and go to the head of the bed where McFarlane
lay he then addressed himself to me in
the following manner, do not I want to
tell but it seems like I want, he then
paused a minute or two and then said I want
to make acknowledgements about the due
to my son, I did not so fully understand
him and then asked him if he wished attor
to be made to his son what to the land he
intended for him he answered yes, that was
his meaning that he should have a little
as soon as it could be made, then
asked him if he had any more land
answered yes, I then asked him what was
to be done with the balance of the land
and he said for my other son (and turned
his eyes toward his wife who sat on the side
of the bed and for her and said nothing
more to me on the above subject (as in the

P.S. after Mr McFarlane had made his will
and his wife and me respecting making his
son Robert a title to his lands, Mr McFarlane
asked him what was to be done with all the
rest for you and my son Thomas, then I
asked (after Mr McFarlane enquired what
to be done with all the rest if he had any
more land, and his answer was he had all
then asked him what he wanted to be done
with the balance of the land and he
answered as before stated for his other son
and turned his eyes toward his wife and said for
her

 unto god, calling unto mind the mortality
 of my body and knowing that it is appointed
 for all men once to die, do make and Ordain
 this my last will and testament, that is to
 say principally and first of I give & recommend
 my soul into the hands of almighty god
 that gave it and my body I recommend
 to the Earth to be buried in a decent
 Christian Burial at the discretion of my executors
 nothing doubting but at the general resurrection
 I shall receive the same again by the mighty
 power of god and as touching such worldly
 Estate wherewith it hath pleased god to bless
 me in this life, I give, devise and bequeath

is to say, first I recommend my soul to god who

Secondly I order that my youngest son William Dixon
a pay to my oldest child David thirty dollars
and my house bill — I order that my son
William pay to David Wood my son in law the
sum of thirty dollars Fourthly, I order that my
son William Dixon pay to James Brooks the
sum of Margaret Dixon my oldest daughter the sum
of thirty dollars and every other lawful bill
One dollar, fifthly I leave to my youngest son
William Dixon my land and plantation two
hundred and sixteen acres in the County of
Sixthly I leave to my youngest daughter Mary
Wood and my personal property at my decease
I constitute and appoint my trust friend William Dixon
and David Wood my lawful executors to execute
this my last will & Testament, making
