 I Charles Bann of Kentucky and
 State of Kentucky being in perfect mind and
 memory and knowing the mortality of my
 body and that it is appointed for all men once
 to die I do hereby give my soul to God
 Almightly God that I saw it and my body
 to the last of my life where it was taken to be
 buried with decent burial at the discretion of
 my Executors to be hereafter named And as
 for my worldly goods that God in his goodness
 has thus pleased to bestow upon I dispose of
 them in the following manner I will
 that my will and claim is that all my
 law full debts be forthwith discharged by

said Executors by expending to have so much
 my property as shall be sufficient to answer
 that purpose
 I then give and bequeath to my son James
 Bann one hundred acres of land Situate and
 lying in Christian County on the waters of the
 muddy Fork a branch of Little River being
 one half of two hundred acres being the portion
 of his half brother George the town also one horse
 mare and woman's saddle two Bed & furniture
 two guns and quarts also one to own and
 gear a pot and Bake oven likewise four
 silver basins two Dishes and eight plates with
 silver knives and three forks all the above
 named articles is now in the actual possession
 of my said wife to my Son
 I then give and bequeath to my Son in
 law Andrew Collins one Bed and furniture
 which said Collins has now in his possession
 I then give and bequeath to my Son in law
 James Thomas one Bed and furniture which
 said Thomas has now in his possession I do
 bequeath to said Thomas my paper covered
 trunk
 I then give and bequeath to Richard the son
 my Son-in-law one Bed and furniture which
 said Thomas has now in his possession
 I then give and bequeath to my Son John a man
 fifty acres of land that I at present reside on
 also one horse mare and black toll one
 year old likewise my saddle and bridle
 as to a Bed and furniture I then give
 and bequeath to my Daughter Elizabeth one Bed
 and furniture also a Bedstead and my two
 wheel the residue of my property of my
 remains after discharging my last debts
 my will and desire is that it be paid
