In the name of God Amen.

I Joseph Gamble of this County of Cheshire and state of
Kentucky being very weak as body but in perfect mind and memory
thinketh he should, looking to mind the mortality of my body and
knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, I do make
and ordain this my last will and testament, that is to say, first
and first of all I give and recommend my soul into the hands of him
that giveth, and my Body to the Earth to be buried in a decent
Christian like manner at the discretion of my executors, and
as touching such worldly estate as it has pleased God to bestow
upon me with in this life I give devise and bequeath of the same in
the following manner and form viz.

First, I give and bequeath to my wife Betty Gamble the plantation
 the plantation whereon we now live, to be at her disposal during life
 then to be sold, and equally divided among all my children. It is also
 my will that my other plantation shall be sold, when my daughter
 Mary Gamble comes to be of age, and the money to be equally divided
 among my children. I desire to receive her part thereof when and
 the other children's parts to be put out at interest so that they may
 receive it as they become of age. It is my will that the property arising
 from both plantations to the time of sale, shall be for the maintenance
 and benefit of my wife and children - It is also my will that my
 wife Betty Gamble should have all my personal property to be at her
 disposal (with the consent and advice of my Executors) for the use of
 maintaining and schooling my children. It is my will that my children
 should be well educated, in particular the boys. All notes and Bonds
 due to me or that may become due, I want immediately collected
 and all my just debts paid, the balance to be disposed of as my
 wife shall direct. I may think most beneficial for the family and for
 the use of my wife Betty Gamble and the property that may
 then remain if any together with the above plantation shall be
 now paid out to her and the money equally divided among my
 children. I do make, constitute and appoint my Trust
 friends William Smith, and John and Jonathan my Executors,
 and do hereby ratify and confirm the same.
