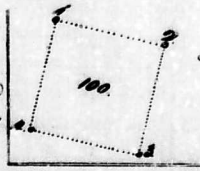

I David Hershner of the State of Kentucky and County of Christian County, being very sick and weak in body, but in perfect mind and memory, thanks be given to God, taking into consideration the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make and ordain this my last will and testament, that is to say, Principally and first of all I give and bequeath my soul into the hands of Almighty God that gives it, and my body I recommend to the Earth, to be buried in decent Christian burial as the directions of my Executors, nothing doubting but at the general Resurrection, I shall receive the same again by the mighty power of God, and as touching such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me in this life I give, devise and dispose of the same in the following manner and form and to the intent

Hershner my loving wife one third of the land, one Cow and two sheep & I bequeath give William Hershner, to her for lifetime or to her heirs or of age not at her death to make the care of Jones Hershner my son and sons Hebequath to Jones Hershner, my son and my sons a property or two thirds of my death and the other third at the death of his mother Elizabeth Hershner, said Jones Hershner, is to give Elizabeth Hershner a Brown Mare called Jan - my son Jones Hershner I constitute make and appoint my sole Executor of this my last will and testament.

And third to Polly Hershner, Jones Hershner is to give a corral, black face Cows, a bear and furniture and two sheep and one Cow, the best ring and household furniture except so much as is otherwise disposed of is to be divided between Elizabeth Hershner, Sonnet Polly equally, the balance of the Cows and sheep which is not otherwise disposed of may what they can be made, early, grand is to be sold and the money divided between my four daughters Katherine Brown, Elizabeth Brown, Margaret Brown, Polly Hershner, my son Jones Hershner, whom I have appointed my Executor, Hebequath to him one Cow with all the farming utensils, plows, gear and all such other tools as is on the place.

I hereby ratify and confirm this to be my last will and testament and no other.
