

I William Weaver of Christian County State of Kentucky being of sound mind & memory but weak in body & knowing it is appointed for all men to die & knowing bettering it would be better for me to make due disposition of my estate for the benefit of my family I do make and give this my last will & testament, I recommend my soul to God & my pray to a decent burying at the discretion of my Executors.

I give unto my son Henry & Dover one negro woman by the name of Fanny & her increase also two of her children by the name of Abby and Sally one girl by the name of Fanny one girl by the name of Peggy one man by the name of Adams, one boy by the name of Moses & their increase. I give unto my son Allen Weaver the following negroes to wit. One woman by the name of Sally & her of her children by the name of Marshall & Francis. One woman by the name of Fanny & her child by the name of Fanny & her boys by the name of Vincent & Willie & one man by the name of Anthony and their increase. I give unto my son William living Weaver four thousand dollars which is to be placed in the hands of my son Henry E. Weaver for the benefit of my son William living Weaver & said Henry is to let said William have the same at such time & in such way that he may see he stands in need of the same for his maintenance in case said William living Weaver should die without issue what may remain in the hands of said Henry of the aforesaid is to be equally divided between said Henry E. Weaver & my son Allen Weaver but should said William living Weaver die having any heirs then and in that case the residue of any of the aforesaid four thousand dollars shall go to said Henry and the said Henry shall account by proper vouchers to my son Allen or William living Weaver heirs of any he may have further disposal thereof.

I give unto my son Henry E. Weaver the tract of land on which I live by his paying my son Allen Weaver one thousand dollars in money equal to specie & if said Henry and son Allen cannot take the said tract of land on these conditions my son Allen is to have the privilege of taking the said land by his giving to his brother Henry one thousand dollars in the same kind of money for his part of the same. I all the lands which I hold title to in the State of Messing which is seven quarter sections it is my will and desire that my Executors shall sell & convey the whole of the same when they may think expedient & divide the profits arising from said sales between my son Henry E. Weaver & Allen Weaver. And I give all and every species of property that I possess or have title to that is not previously disposed of in this will unto my son Henry E. Weaver & Allen Weaver my son which is to be equally divided between them also what I give my said son Henry E. Weaver & Allen Weaver all the moneys on hand & which is due me when collected and I do hereby appoint Henry E. Weaver

James Bradley my Executor to this my last will & testament, in testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this 12<sup>th</sup> day of November 1822.

In the name of God Amen I John a Mallay Sen. of the State of Kentucky Christian County being of sound mind and memory and knowing it is appointed for all men to die & knowing bettering it would be better for me to make and publish this my last will and testament in manner and form following (that to wit) First I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Sarah Mallay one fourth part of my tract of land including my farm Orchard and house to be his and for his benefit during her natural life after her decease it is my will that it shall be my son John Mallay and his heirs for his and their benefit with all that appertaineth thereto I also give and bequeath unto my beloved wife the following property (that is to wit) One negro boy named James and one black mare one cow all and the harness belonging thereto also one bed and furniture and the choice of a cow or two and calf and a saddle if she wanteth it is further my will and desire after the decease of my wife exclusive of the lands that the remaining property which I have given her negro boy and all shall be sold and the price equally divided amongst my children it is also my will that my son John Mallay shall have the use of one half of my farm and one half of my Orchard for his benefit and the house he now occupies and the house I now live in of my wife does and choose to occupy it herself but it is my will that he should have the privilege of selling or leasing the same until after the decease of my beloved wife I also give and bequeath unto my son John a Mallay forty five acres of land it being the lands which I bought of T. Buckley lying & being in the County aforesaid to be his and for the benefit of him and his heirs with all that appertaineth thereto I also give and bequeath unto my two oldest sons Thomas Mallay & William Mallay and my son in law Thomas Davis and their heirs & assigns one hundred acres of land a piece including each of their

173 and frames, to be distributed for each of their benefit and behoof, with all that appertains thereto, it is further my Will that if there should be more than five hundred acres of land in my home tract that the Over plus shall be equally divided between my wife my two sons and my four daughters by entering each tract equally. There is one acre and three quarters of land remaining of the tract of land which I bought of P. Whistler it is my Will that my son William Mallory shall have it for his benefit and behoof with all that appertains thereto and lastly as to all the Test. residue and remainder of my Estate both Real and personal goods and Chattels of what kind and nature soever it is my Will that it shall be sold in a Credit of twelve months and the money they shall bring be equally divided amongst my wife and children and I do hereby appoint James A. Lindsey and my sisters Wife Sarah Mallory Executors & Administrators of this my last Will and Testament hereby bequeathing all former Wills by me made in which I have heretofore set my hands and seal this the twelfth day of June in the Year of our Lord eighteen hundred and twenty four my hand sealed, published & declared in the presence of John Mallory Senr. to be his last Will & Testament in the presence of us who have heretofore subscribed our names as witnesses in the presence of the Testator

By order of the Court appointed commissioners by the Court of Chancery at their December Term 1822 to divide the estate of Thomas B. Whitthall the between his Children having met at the late Residence of said decedent on the 7th of January 1823 proceeded to divide the Slaves and the amount due to each legatee arising from the sale of the personal Estate of said decedent as appears from the Inventory of the said decedent to us by the Administrators as follows to wit:

Which divided by (16 the number of legatees) leaves to each one the sum of \$ 667.10

The Twelve Negroes to be divided were parcelled out into ten slaves as nearly equal as could make them, and their names written on tickets, and drawn for by the legatees and where any Negro drawn by any of the legatees amounted to more than \$667.10 they gave their notes for the balance to those whose were deficient. There was no more as follows

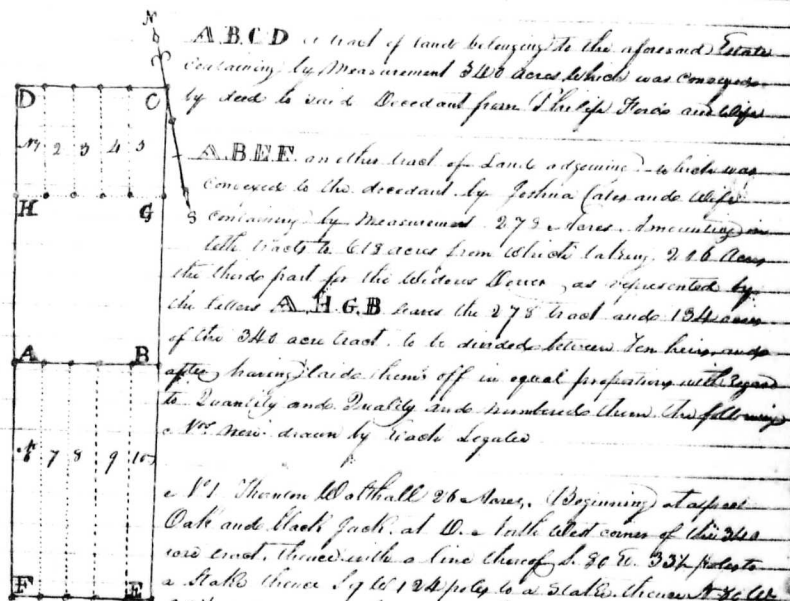

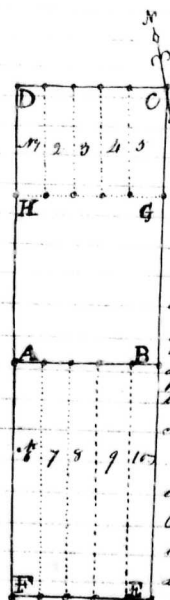
