Johnson William Sandy and Miss James Ruffin executors of this my last will and Testament. 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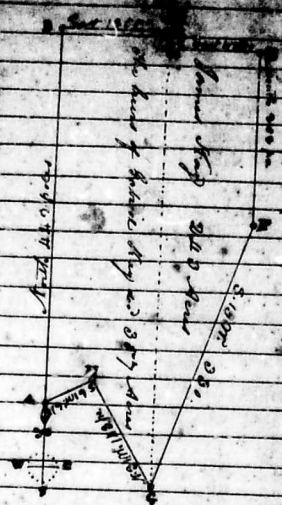
