In the name of god Amen, I Elizabeth Pritchey of the County of Cumberland state of Kentucky do make and ordain this my last will & testament in manner & form following (to-wit) First I give and bequeath unto my beloved son James Pritchey my negro boy named Joe age a twenty niny years — I give and bequeath unto my beloved children — Esther Smith, Eunice Hillis, John Pritchey, Sabi pen Allen, William Pritchey, Polly Williams & Betsey Corn each forty Dollars — I also give and bequeath unto Eunice Hillis my bed and all the furniture belonging thereto — I give and bequeath unto my son Samuel Pritchey four hundred dollars — lastly, I give and bequeath unto my son James Pritchey all the remainder of my Estate of what nature or kind soever, and do name, constitute and make him my sole Executor — In witness whereof I have here unto set my hand and seal this 12th day of May in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and nineteen — signed, sealed, published & declared by the above Elizabeth Pritchey (said) named Elizabeth Pritchey in the presence of us who sign our names as witnesses in the presence of the Testatrix

The Nuncupative Will of John Page spoken in his last illness and at his own house when he died on the 28th day of May 1819 in Cumberland County being in his proper mind, he the decedent stated that as to his worldly affairs his will was that what money he had he left to his wife dores to be at her own disposal, also that what property, goods, chattel, rights and credits he died possessed of, should be at the disposal of his said wife dores for and during her widowhood, and that upon the decease of the said dores the whole was to be equally divided amongst his children. This Will was spoken in presence of Lucy Kirkpatrick, Catharine Biggers, John B. Page, & Samuel W. Page -
