Obadiah Baker Deceased

I Obadiah Baker of the County of Cumberland and State of Kentucky  
 do hereby make and publish this my last Will and Testament in witness  
 and form as followeth - That is to say  
 I leave to my beloved wife Elizabeth during her natural life the  
 tract of land on which I now live say the old survey containing as  
 supposed about one hundred and 64 acres with all its appurtenances

and privileges therein belonging or in any wise appurtenant to the same together with two other surveys made in my name containing in both about one hundred fifty acres lying on the south side of Little Runcks Creek - I also lend to my said wife Elizabeth during her natural life all the residue of my property of every kind and description whether with the exception of what may herein after be divided - I give to my son John M. Baker the tract of land I purchased from Rice Haggard containing 100 acres as per deed from Haggard to myself and bunch of the tract purchased from George Rowland as lies below a certain ditch now at the upper end of the field partitioned by said John M. the dividing line to run parallel with the

Ditch and to extend to the back line on each side of the creek the ditch to be the base of the dividing line between said John M. and Aljemon S. - I give to my son Aljemon S. Baker the ballance of the tract of land purchased from George Rowland up to the line of my original survey of 864 acres making that line the base and running with it parallel line to the back line on each side of the creek to include all the land that may be in that boundary of the survey made by me on the south side of the creek with the special reservation of the field lying above a small branch or drain which is in or will be in all the lane making between myself and said Aljemon S. the reservation to be held subject to the use and benefit of my said wife Elizabeth during her natural life and at her death to pass to and the absolute property of the said Aljemon S. together with all the appurtenances and privileges thereunto belonging or in any wise appurtenant - The lands then given to said John M. and Aljemon S. is by me estimated and valued at the sum of \$1500 fifteen hundred dollars to be divided between them and accounted for in by them in a future distribution and division of my estate - I give to my daughter Elizabeth Chatham one negro woman named Lucy and a child Jane at the value of \$600. dollars both of which she has heretofore received say in the year 1833. - I give to my daughter Sorancy Carter one negro woman named Lucy (the other) at the value of \$300. which she has heretofore received say about the year 1829. I also give said Sorancy one negro girl named Lucinda at the value of \$250 which she has heretofore received in the year 1835.

I give to my daughter Polly Jones one negro girl named Mimmy at the value of \$250 which she has received heretofore about the year 1835. I give to my daughter Jane Hutchon after the death of my wife Elizabeth one negro girl named Margaret at the value of \$230 and as much more (including the value of said Margaret) of my estate as to make her part or portion equal to that of the ballance of my children - I give to my daughter Sally Anne Allen one negro girl named Martha at the value of \$250 which she has heretofore received in the year 1837. It is my will and desire after the death of my wife Elizabeth that all the property I own as well as personal named in this preceding part of this my will as being loaned to her be divided and distributed amongst all my children in such manner as to make all their parts or portions equal nothing into the estimation that or which

And for thorough it is my Will & desire & I think it practicable in the sale of the residue of the lands & the personal property to make the portions of the Children equal without settling selling any of the Slaves. Which can be valued and taken by the Children at their valuation in case any two or more of the Children should make choice of the same slave that they the Contending parties decide the same by balloting for it. I have in this short instrument divided out amongst my Children all of my property in such manner as I have conceived to be just & right according to their various Circumstances & situations - and sincerely hope and desire that they may receive the same according to my Will & live in peace and harmony one with another - and do hereby and lastly nominate and appoint my sons John M. Baker and Aljerson S. Baker Executors of this my last will and Testament hereby revoking all other and former Wills by me made - As Witness my hand and seal this 26<sup>th</sup> day of December 1836.
