New Orleans June 16th 1835
 1835 This is John Marten Alexander an Granville Bowman
 of Burkesville, as I feel very bad on that I have but little time
 to live, I beg the favour of you too, to settle my business, when
 the return of my tobacco comes home - I have a great many open
 Counts against the people, they are all full, and I want you to
 inform yourselves, if any should be disputed, for I am
 certain there is not one sent in my books unjust; As to my
 estate it is very small, to leave to my dear wife and children,
 but it was honestly got, and I hope it will wear well, as I do not
 understand writing the form of a will, I hope the judge of the Court
 or others, will not allow mine to be broke, by any means whatever.
 I call on all of my friends to depart by wishes, what little property
 we have got lovingly, we have worked together to get it, and with glad
 and grateful hearts, I leave it with my dear wife and children.
 I do hereby give my ever blessed wife Abedine all my
 horses, Cattle, pigs, Sheep and farming utensils an all of
 her house hold an kitchen furniture and and our own negro
 girl named Mary forever, to do as she pleases with, if there is
 that much left after paying my debts, which I am sure there
 will be, and some Cash to spare, and I also give her all my
 money, after paying my just debts - I also give her all my lands
 her life time, that she may have a chance to keep the children
