 feather bed which he has got and the furniture, three dishes
 six plates, half dozen knives and forks, and half dozen cups &
 saucers, one pot and one Dutch iron, to him and his heirs forever
 3^d. I give to my son Lemmas Bowman the tract of land, that
 now lies on, three negroes to wit, John, Daniel & Caroline
 one feather bed & furniture, thirty head of hogs, two
 dishes, six plates, half dozen cups and saucers, half dozen
 knives and forks, to him and his heirs forever. 4th. I give to
 Ann C. Nesby one negro boy Jerry by name, to her and her
 heirs forever. 5th. All the remainder of my estate is
 to be equally divided amongst all my children, Francis W.
 Bowman, William Bowman, Lemmas Bowman, Frances C. Taylor,
 Ann C. Nesby, Pamela C. Thurman, Marley C. Brathall and
 Nicky W. Holtley and their heirs forever - 6th. I do appoint
 my two sons Francis W. Bowman and William Bowman my two
 lawfull executors of this my last will and testament
 revoking and disannulling all others and former will made
 by me either in word or writing, ratifying this to be my
 last will and testament, thereunto set my hand and
 seal, this fifteenth day of January One thousand, eight
