 negroes last named, together with a negro girl  
 named Nancy were the down slaves of Nancy  
 Heaggard late Whites widow of William Whites dec.  
 That said Nancy was also entitled to have in  
 two tracts of land, the one in Princepsanne and  
 the other in Norfolk County Virginia, and that  
 said Guardian for himself and his ward and  
 Samuel Whites for himself sold to said Nancy  
 and Rice Heaggard her husband the said neg-  
 ro girl Nancy (being one of the down slaves  
 and received in payment, her down in the four  
 negroes last named aforesaid and the said tracts  
 of land, and the interest of said Rice in the  
 said negroes & Princepsanne land: we further  
 report that the said Heamesch and King  
 admit the above accounts and this Report to  
 be true, and to include the whole accounts and  
 transactions of said Guardian up to this date, all  
 which we report to said Court of Cumberland County

In obedience to an Order from the County Court  
Cumberland to us, the undersigned Commissioners directed,  
we being first duly sworn hereo proceeded to value and divide  
four negro children slaves, to wit, Bridgett, Jane and Molly  
& Betty a part of the blow or slaves of Nancy Haggard late  
Wife of William Wiles, between the three heirs of the said Nancy  
Wife of William Wiles, deceased; which the said heirs  
bought of the said Mrs Haggard late wife her dower in the  
said negroes, and also her dower in the tract of land in  
~~Prince Georges and Norfolk County Virginia~~ and also pur-  
chased Rice Haggards Interest in the Prince Georges tract, Virginia;  
as a consideration for the above blowers and Interest they gave  
to said Rice and his heirs one of the said Nancys dower slaves,  
named, Nancy. - We find that William Hancock Jr who  
deceased with Nancy Anne Wiles and of the heirs purchased  
of Samuel Wiles his third in the blow or slaves aforesaid and  
therefore, he is, by purchase entitled to two thirds, and  
Susan Wiles (now King) the last and third heir is Entitled to  
one third of the aforesaid blow or slaves: and we the Com-  
missioners proceed to lay off and assign to each heir  
their proportionate part, by the number of the said slaves  
and their value thereto assessed, to wit,

To William Hancock Jr his third and the third he purchased  
" of Samuel Wiles, we allot Negroes Bridgett, Jane and Molly  
" valued to \$400 - \$250 - and \$175 - each - -  
To Susan Wiles (now King) we allot negro boy John valued  
" to Three hundred and fifty dollars -

We find in the above valuation and allotment of the  
aforesaid negroes, that William Hancock junior two thirds  
amounts to Eight hundred and twenty five dollars;  
and we find in the allotment to Susan ~~Wiles~~ King  
(late Wiles) her one third amounts to \$391.66 2/3 each -

Was also fined and bleinde that William Hancock for  
pay back to Susan King, late Wife, the amount of his  
two thirds forty and thollan six, six & two third parts -  
all which was Report to the County Court of Cumberland  
and make this a final division the day and date  
above written
