 two Daughters last named, first Lucrey & Letticy; and
 it is to be understood, further, that at the death or marriage
 of my wife; that the negro Boy Bill is to be Equally divi-
 ded between my two last Daughters named; and lastly
 I do hereby constitute and appoint my son Edward Paul
 to execute this my last will and testament, hereby
 revoking all former wills by me made, In witness
 whereunto I have set my hand and seal this 21st of
