I William Ball of Cumberland County, and State of Kentucky, being infirm in body, but of sound mind and memory, and calling to mind the ~~nearness~~ nearness of death, do make, constitute and ordain this my last will and Testament in the manner & form as followeth; first I give my soul to god and my body to the dust from whence it came: secondly It is my will and desire that all my just debts be paid & satisfied: 3<sup>rd</sup> I leave to my well beloved wife Letty during her

life or widowhood, on third part of my land that I live on, so  
 as to include the whole of my plantation, together with five negroes  
 to wit, The two Dams, Pile, Ob. and Lutick, which negro girl  
 Lutick is to be given up to my youngest Daughter, Betty at age  
 or marriage, together with her increase; also I lend to my wife  
 one feather Bed and furniture together with one third part  
 of my stock, house hold and kitchen furniture, the Gallies  
 of the Prize Excepted - 4<sup>th</sup> I give to my son Edward (Dare)  
 one negro woman Sam with her three boy children, to wit, Robert,  
 Will and Stephen; which is to be the total amount of his  
 portion devised by me: except what I have proposed him  
 with; 5<sup>th</sup> I give to my son Shoshier Dare the tract of land  
 I purchased of John Oldham, containing ninety seven  
 and three quarter acres, which I hold James and Will-  
 iam C. Williams title for; which is to be the hole of  
 his portion devised by me including what he received of me  
 at marriage: 6<sup>th</sup> I give to my son Thomas Dare the hundred  
 acres of land, that was taken up and surveyed in the name  
 of Matthews, with an addition of twelve and a half acres  
 taken up and surveyed in the name of James M. Colgan:  
 7<sup>th</sup> I give and bequeath <sup>me</sup> to my son Ephraim Dare the  
 hundred acres of land that I now live on taken up and  
 surveyed in the name of Thomas Ray, subject to my wife's  
rule, before named in my will; with an addition of twelve  
 and a half acres, taken up and surveyed by James  
 M. Colgan - also it is my will and desire, that my two sons  
 last named to wit, Thomas and Ephraim have young Sam at  
 the death or marriage of their mother, equal between them,  
 it is further to be understood, that my two sons last  
 named, is to be furnished with a horse, saddle and  
 bridle each worth Eighty Dollars; also one Bed and fur-  
 niture worth thirty Dollars each; - 8<sup>th</sup> it is my will  
 and desire that my Daughter Lavinia Ray have the tract of  
 land containing twenty five acres, that was taken up and  
 surveyed in the name of Stone, together with a negro girl named  
 Moriah, which land and negro girl is not to become subject  
 to her representative which is John Ray, but to pass and go

for her use, during her natural life, and at her death  
 the said land and negro with its increase to go unto  
 children born of the said Living Ray, which is the  
 total amount of her part devised by me, including  
 what she received of me, at marriage: 9<sup>thly</sup> I give  
 and bequeath unto my Daughter Lucrey Paul and  
 negro give Jimmy with her future increase, together  
 with one feather Bed and furniture, worth thirty  
 Dollars, also I give and bequeath unto my daughter  
 Letticy Paul, in addition to what I have heretofore given  
 named; one feather Bed and furniture worth thirty  
 Dollars; - my stith and the balance of my property  
 named, to be sold and equally divided between my  
 two Daughters last named, wit<sup>h</sup> Lucrey & Letticy; and  
 it is to be understood, further, that at the death or marriage  
 of my wife; that the negro Boy Bill is to be Equally divi-  
 ded between my two last Daughters named; and lastly  
 I do hereby constitute and appoint my son Edward Paul  
 to execute this my last will and testament, hereby  
 revoking all former wills by me made, In witness  
 whereunto I have set my hand and seal this 21<sup>st</sup> of  
 March 1818

Now the name of God Amen. I Joseph Daugherty of the County  
of Sumnerland & State of Kentucky considering the uncertainty  
of this mortal life and being of sound and sober mind and  
myself to Almighty God for the said, do make and  
publish this my last will and testament, in manner and  
form following (that is to say) First I give and bequeath unto  
my beloved wife Elizabeth Daugherty all my Estate real &  
personal, goods and chattels of what kind and nature seem-  
ing during her natural life if she continued in a state of mar-  
riage and unmarried for that time and at her death my  
will is that my Estate or so much thereof as may be remaining  
be divided as follows: My negro girl baby, my wife shall  
dispose of to whom and in what manner she may think  
proper My negro Boy Andrew shall choose his master from  
among my sons and if he should amount to more than  
an equal share then his master chosen as above shall pay  
the overplus to the rest of my heirs, but if he should choose  
a master that is not willing to accept of him then he shall  
make another choice if he also refuse him the negro shall  
make another choice until he chooses one whom to take him  
or until they all refuse in which case he is to be sold and  
the money arising from the sale as well as all the rest  
of my Estate real personal to be divided equally among  
my heirs at my wife's decease - with the exception of  
the above named negro girl baby whom my wife may  
dispose of as she thinks proper - that should my wife  
die or be named after my decease then this will shall  
be null void to all intents and purposes and in such  
case my will is that my Estate be divided agreeably to  
the laws of the state of Kentucky - In witness whereof  
I signed my name and affix my seal this 4<sup>th</sup> day of August  
1818 signed and acknowledged in the presence of
