In the name of God amen - I William Ford of the County of Cumberland, and State of Kentucky, being sick in body but in perfect mind and memory, and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, and to make this my last will and testament, and first of all, unto God, and my body to the earth, and as for my temporal estate of such goods, chattels as it hath pleased God to bestow upon me, I give and bequeath in manner following My first of all to give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Anna Ford, one third part of all my estate, both personal and real, during her widowhood, but in case of marriage to return to my heirs - 2^d I give, bequeath unto Elizabeth Harper daughter of Anna Harper now wife of William Ford, one stud Colt called Bluster 3^d I give bequeath unto my daughter Lydia Ford fifty dollars - 4th I give and bequeath unto my daughter Jane fifty dollars, and altho it is my ~~desire~~ will at that Mother death, house all the hold furniture is to say - the 3 girls Elizabeth, and Lydia & Jane - and is my will that Anna Ford shall have two Cows extra. 5th I give and bequeath unto my 2 sons John & James Ford the plantation that I now live on, to be equally divided, between them both at their mothers death or marriage - I witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand seal this thirt day of February in the year of our Lord eight hundred and twenty four I also

appoint my wife, Jane Harper and David Cook to be executors to this my last will and Testament

Memo June 21st 1816

Be it known and remembered that I Thomas Sackman of Cumberland County and State of Kentucky am justly entitled to all that part of the military survey of 400 acres in which William Sackman Senr now lives, which lies within the following bounds to wit - Beginning at a black walnut and sugar tree in my plantation corner to said Military survey, thence along that line of said survey, which runs towards Cumberland river to a pole more or less to the nearest corner of said survey, from the said walnut and sugar tree corner, thence down the ~~river~~ bottom, precisely parallel to the river line of said survey to the creek that runs thro my plantation, and between said Williams river field and his home lots; thence up said creek to the mouth of the first branch that comes in on the lower side, commonly called the tick branch, thence up said branch so far that a straight line from said branch to the back line of said survey, will include all the ground on which Thomas Kickenbollen and Richard Sackman deceased, deadened the timber, thence along said straight line to said back line, thence along said back line to the before mentioned black walnut and sugar tree in my plantation - &c &c. I have not the military courses ~~any~~ of the survey by me, or I could have given a more accurate description

But what I have said will be sufficient, I will only add that the above mentioned straight line, is to be perpendicular to the above mentioned back line

Cumberland County June 27th 1816 It is my desire, wish and will, that my little estate, either real or personal is, and the same is hereby given to my sisters Peggy, Sally & Judith and my brother Alexander, each of them to have an equal share except Alexander who is to have a half share, but he is to have my books extra - Now if I should depart this life, without finally making and

declaring a last will and testament, the above is to be considered as such, and to be held sacred and inviolable, the Court to appoint executors who shall pay all my just debts before distribution, the Court to allow them a reasonable compensation for their services
