William Goodson I being weak in body but in sound mind and memory to the end I may be the better prepared to leave this world whenever it shall please god to call me hence do therefore make and declare this my last will and testament in manner following (Wiz) my desire is that my beloved wife Martha Goodson remain in possession of the houses & plantations wherein we now live and that she have free use of said houses & tenements untill our youngest child be twentyone years of age and after wards so much of the proceeds of the lands as may be sufficient for her support during her life or her continuance single & after her death or marriage the sd lands with all its appurtenances to be equally divided between our three children James M Goodson Isaac H Goodson & Martha Goodson, and I give and bequeath to my said wife one some mare and colt also two cows & calves to gether with all the sheep and hogs now in our possession also two feather beds & furniture to gether with the household and kitchen furniture I give and bequeath my son James M Goodson one dark bay colt one cow and calf & one rifle gun, I give my son Isaac H Goodson one sorrel horse the remainder of my cattle and other

property not herein named to be equally divided among the three above named children share and share alike, and I make and ordain my brothers Josiah Goodson & Samuel Goodson executors of this my last will and testament in testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 25th of April 1823

I John Alexander of the county of Cumberland and state of Kentucky being weak in body but of a perfect and sound mind do make this my last will and testament after my just debts being paid, I do hereby dispose of all my worldly goods in the following manner I give to my son Thomas Alexander two negroes named Isaac & Polly, I give to my son John M. Alexander two negroes named Jacob & Lewis I give to my daughter Sarah C. Batten two negroes named Agnes and Sarah one feather bed and furniture and bedstead, I give to my son Ingram Alexander one negro man named Peter I give in trust to my son John M. Alexander and Rubino Alexander for the use and benefit of my daughter Elizabeth Smith one tract of land whereon she now lives containing one hundred and twenty five acres more or less and two negroes named Sam & Jack Sam, and one feather bed and furniture and one bedstead and at the decease of Thomas Smith and his present wife Elizabeth the said land to be equally divided between his two sons John M. Smith and Thomas Smith, I give to my son Robert Alexander two negroes named David and Bayson I give to my daughter Obadiah Feathercut one negro man named Jack Sam & thirty five dollars in lieu of one feather bed and furniture, I give to my son Rubin Alexander one negro man named Patrick and that part of my tract of land whereon I now live that lies on the upper or west side of the creek that divides the plantation and my family till and one fourth part of my stock of cattle and one third part of my stock of sheep and one third part of my stock of hogs in quality, I give to my son Joseph Alexander one negro man named Adams, one cow and calf now in his possession and two hundred dollars in the hands of J. M. P. R. Alexander I give to my son Philip Alexander one negro man named Valentine and all that part of my tract of land that lies on the southeast side of the creek that runs through the plantation whereon Robert Alexander formally lived, I give to my daughter Susanna Hall one negro woman named Susanna her two children with all her future increase during her natural life and at her death to be equally divided amongst the heirs of her body, one cow &
