I give my daughter Judith Min one horse best Saddle, one Cow & Calf, one bed & furniture, all of which she having heretofore recd.

I give to my daughter Polly Carter, one horse best, one Saddle, one Cow & Calf & one bed & furniture, all of which she having heretofore received.

I give to my daughter Virginia White, one horse best, one Saddle, one Cow & Calf, one bed & furniture, all of which she having heretofore received.

I give to my son Eliazer C. Baker one negro boy named Hodgson, one boy mare, one Cow & Calf, one bed and furniture, all of which he having heretofore received, except the negro.

I give to my son Martin Baker, one negro boy named Sathan one Black Mare's filly, one Cow & Calf one bed & furniture, none of which he has received.

I give to my son Samuel A. Baker, one negro boy named Obediah, one boy mare, one Cow & Calf, one bed & furniture, all of which he having heretofore received, except the negro.

I give to my daughter Hannah Baker, one negro girl named Mary, one Sorrel horse called Whip, one Cow & Calf, one bed & furniture and my bureau, none of which she has received.

And it is my will & desire that my daughter Hannah, shall have the full privilege to live in my mansion house, during her natural life, or as long as she may live single.

I give to my three sons, Martin, Eliazer C. & Samuel A. Baker, the tract of land on which I now live, together with my undivided interest held in the Mill with its appurtenances (with my Brothers John and James Baker) to be equally divided between them, according to quantity & quality, to be paid off and divided in such manner, that Samuel A. take the place on which I now live, and Eliazer C. the place on which he now lives, and Martin the balance, to them & their heirs forever.
