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In the name of God. Amen. I William Barr. Being of sound mind and disposing memory & knowing the uncertainty of life and the certainty of death do make and constitute this my last will & Testament hereby and by this solemn act. revoking & rescinding every former will or wills by me made to wit. First. I desire that all my obligations to my fellow men be discharged and that all my just debts be paid out of my estate.

Second. After payment of my debts as above directed & Required it is my will that my dearly beloved wife Mildred Barr. take & I do hereby will & Bequeath to her all of my estate real personal & mixed to have and to hold the same together with all the appurtenances and fixtures thereto Belonging or in any wise appertaining during her life & at her death to be disposed of as she may by will direct. And it is further my will that if my <sup>dear</sup> wife Mildred Barr should ever marry again her husband is to take no interest in the estate hereby willed and devised. But it is my express will and desire that my <sup>dear</sup> wife should take the estate in her own right & for her own Benefit.
