Know all men by these presents that I Jacob Davis
 of the County of Davis and state of Kentucky
 Annoying the uncertainty of life and the uncertainty
 of life and the certainty of death being in tolerable
 health and the full possession of the mental powers
 by which I was endowed by nature do make this my
 last will & testament to my youngest son George
 Davis I leave the two surveys of land which were
 bought of Ben Taylor & Henry B Taylor and
 containing one hundred acres and the other twenty
 acres with this provision that he pay two
 hundred and fifty dollars to the father here as
 hereafter provided
 To my son Jacob W Davis I give one hundred
 dollars of the money to be paid by George me
 must formerly his, he increase and one Buckhite son
 To my daughter Sally McNew I give fifty
 dollars of the money to be paid by George. To
 my grand son John Davis the son of
 Sally McNew by the first marriage I
 bequeath fifty dollars of the money to be
 paid by George. To my grand daughter Mary
 Martha A Martin I bequeath my bed and bed
 clothing one cow and twenty five dollars of the
 money to be paid by George Davis. The remaining
 twenty five dollars to be paid by George I bequeath
 to Drucilla Davis my daughter for extra service
 in the attention and taking care of me. The balance
 of my land one hundred and seventy five acres I
 bequeath to Felix G Davis Jacob W Davis and
 Drucilla Davis to be equally divided among them
 My son Nelson Davis has gone to Texas not
 expecting to see him any more and having helped him
 to what I could when he left me. I have
 bequeathed nothing in testimony whereof I have signed
 this testament and delivered it to Ben Johnson
 on the 25th day of January 1867

Article 4th It is furthermore my wish that in Order to pay any debt which I may owe that my representatives sell of my stock &c enough to pay and satisfy all debts against me but if that should not be sufficient then enough of my lands to pay the demands which may be against me at my decease.
