clothes of full cloth to William Clarke, likewise another suit  
of cloth and to my son in law William Holmes another suit of  
cloth, to my son John Clarke in the suit of cloth, and to  
 Maria Henderson I give the large quaint cupboard and chest

Ward and Co. Mary Henderson the large chest, I do hereby  
 nominate constitute and appoint my will executor William  
 Clarke and son in law John Holmes and my nephew  
 Thomas Love of Frankfort and George Elliott of Scott  
 for to be the executors of this my last will and testament  
 and desiring them present all other wills or testament by  
 me made or done, declaring this to be my last will and  
 testament, In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand  
 and seal this twenty second day of October one thousand  
 eight hundred and eight.
