In the name of God Amen I George Hunter son of the
 County of Fayette and State of Kentucky being weak in body
 but of perfect sound sense and memory thanks be to God for
 the same and calling to mind the mortality of my body and
 knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die do
 ordain this my last will and Testament in manner as follow
 ing, Item I lend unto my beloved wife Rachel
 Hunter the tract of land and plantation whereon I live
 during her natural life I also lend to my beloved wife my two
 Negro men William and Benjamin to labor for her until they
 are forty years of age and each of them at age shall be free
 forever after and should my beloved wife die before the said
 Negro men arrive to the age of forty years my beloved wife
 Rachel Hunter may send them to her children for that
 term of time as she thinks proper or to any child or children
 she may have or shall have and the said child or children

kind of that is personal estate after paying out to my children
 the legacies that will be hereafter devised in this will.
 Item I give and bequeath unto my daughter Anna Parrish
 one mare of the Value of twenty pounds and no more in
 addition to what I have before helped her to her and her
 heirs forever Item I also give and bequeath to my son George
 Hunter one cow and calf and no more in addition to what
 I have before advanced to him and his heirs forever.
 Item I also give and bequeath to my son Richard Hunter one
 horn creature to the value of twenty pounds each and two cows
 each and six sheep and one feathered bed furniture I also lend
 to my said son the amount of what my son George has had hitherto
 paid which I shall leave in writing to show after my death and
 no more to him this he has forever Item I give and bequeath to
 my daughter Rachel Hunter one horn creature and saddle to
 the amount of twenty pounds and one bed and bedding and one
 cow and calf and one spinning wheel and no more to her and her
 heirs forever Item I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary
 Hunter one horn creature and saddle to the value of twenty pounds
 one feather bed and furniture and one cow and calf and one
 spinning wheel and no more to her and her heirs forever.
 Item I give and bequeath to my son William Hunter two
 creatures to the value of twenty pounds each and one bed and
 furniture and no more to him and his heirs forever Item I
 give and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Hunter one horn
 creature and saddle to the value of twenty pounds and one bed
 and furniture and one cow and calf and one spinning wheel
 and no more to her and her heirs forever Item I give and
 bequeath unto my son Thomas Hunter under this record
 named in this will and all the household goods and

In the name of God Amen I Henry Bartlett of the County of Payette being in perfect health and memory think well to be to Almighty God for the same do constitute make and ordain this to be my last will and testament in manner and form following: In witness my desire is that all my just debts and funeral expences be first paid and satisfied. Then I lend unto my brother John Crane Bartlett my three my sons Jemmy Gabriel and Daphney during my father Henry Bartlett and my Mother Sarah life and all the rest of my estate be it of whatsoever kind and the profits arising from my said estate lend my brother John during my father and mothers life to be disposed of as they think proper and after the decease of my said father and Mother that my whole estate then be equally divided with the future increase of the said Negroes Jemmy and Daphney between my brother John Crane Bartlett and my five sisters (viz) Elizabeth, Philip, Polly, Sally and Franky Bartlett and if either of them should die before they marry or have lawfull issue then the part devised to be equally divided between them living and their heirs Lastly I appoint my brother John as Bartlett and James Wood whole and sole executors of this my last will and testament. In Testimony whereof I have hereunto affixed my hand and seal this 25th day of July 1792 one thousand seven hundred and ninety two
