and in bad state of health but sound in mind do leave this my
last will and Testament and first my will is that my soul may
be committed to God that gave it and that my body may be
buried in a Christian manner and as for my worldly goods
I leave in the following manner First I leave to my honoured
mother one negro woman and child during her life and at her
death the negro woman and children is to be given to my will
beloved brother Meluen Lowry and next I leave to my oldest
brother John Lowry three heifers which is at his house now
then the remainder of all my property of lands and goods
I leave to be equally divided between my sister Jane Fidd
and Meluen Lowry and my sister Mary Lowry
