 and thirdly and lastly for her to dispose of when and in what manner

 of our Lord 1804. I Charles Mason farmer of the County of Fayette and State of  
 Kentucky being very sick and weak in body but of perfect mind and memory  
 thanks be given to God therefor, calling to mind the mortality of my body  
 knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die do make and ordain  
 this my last will and testament (that is to say principally and first of all  
 I give and recommend my body to the earth to be buried in a Christian like  
 manner at the discretion of my Executors nothing doubting but at the general  
 resurrection I shall receive the same again by the power of God and as touching  
 such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to Bless me in this life  
 I give and devise and dispose of in the following manner and form:

Imprimis, It is my will and I do order it that all my just debts  
 and funeral expenses charge be paid and satisfied, I have given the sum  
 of fifteen hundred pounds currency of the State with my black mens and  
 household furniture to be and his heirs forever to be ~~paid~~ and selling  
 out of my estate, It is my will and I do order it that all my slaves being  
 in number fifteen, after my debts be paid out until the above sum  
 of fifteen hundred pounds be raised after my death of all kind and  
 of personal estate as ~~order~~ to the best advantage, then the above slaves with
